F r o m t h e E d i t o r s

I want to apologize. I, Claudia Novak, am solely responsible for the newsletter being late. There have been many things happening in my life and I was unable to get it done sooner. Poor India has put up with your phone calls. SORRY! I certainly hope it doesn't happen in the future. On to other things....

I hope that you had a chance to read your WPCSA Newsletter and read what happened 46 years ago. To quote: "Mr Harley Heyl noted as chairman while preparations were made for a new corporation charter to be written in the state of Illinois under the name of 'The Welsh Pony Society of America'. The word Cob was dropped from the name because it was agreed that the Cob is not an animal that would ever become popular in America; consequently it would be undesirable to permit crossing these large (usually about 14.2 hands) and heavy animals with the Mountain type Welsh ponies." I did get a chuckle because if Welsh Cobs hadn't become popular, I wouldn't be writing this!

This is "our" (India & Claudia) fourth issue of NACC. It has really been fun and a learning experience. Personally, I don't think that either India or I knew what Cindy and Ann fully meant by NACC being "an act of love". Personally, I think our husbands think that it is an "act of divorce"! No kidding aside, it has been a tremendous amount of work. Both India and I have become concerned about the "business" side of NACC. No, this is not a plea that NACC will not continue but rather question to you about what direction we should be taking.

We have tried 3 (almost 4) different printers. We have tried doing 1/2 tones for picture originals. In this issue, we will be trying my new computer scanner. Personally, we are not totally happy with the output that we can get with newsletter being copied. We do spend hours over ads and picture layout and then.... Well, we are not happy. Are you happy? And if you say no, are you willing to pay more for ads and subscription? Basically, to "offset print" (high quality like a magazine) would about double our costs. Between postage increases, a new printing method, a new shipping method (tried with success to the Canadian's last issue), we would have to raise our subscriptions to \$30 a year including a free directory (5 issues) plus greatly increase ad costs.

Currently each issue is barely funded. We have to worry whether or not we have enough money to pay the postage and printing. All office supplies (toner, ink cartridges and paper) come out of India's and my personal moneys. All phone calls we pay for. We pay for all "non issue" mailings ourselves. Listen, we both love Cobs but....

After much heart-felt discussion, we have decided

to change the format. Future issues of NACC will be on newsprint in a larger tabloid (newspaper format). We will also started using a "mailing permit" which means that you in the States will be receiving NACC via Third Class. This is being done to save money so we can continue to give you the information that you want at similar reasonable costs. The new ad sizes and costs will be listed later in the newsletter.

We will be using "zip lock" plastic bags for this mailing. In the past, I think the postal office has a special newsletter "eater" that likes to torment our readership. In turn, it torments us because you get VERY upset that, "WE HAVEN'T MAILED THE NEWSLETTER TO YOU!". Listen, you don't have to hear my daughter and husband when it is time to put 200 mailing labels and stamps on the newsletter! Every single mailing label and stamp has been carefully and lovely placed (whine! Whine! WHINE!) on each newsletter.

In preparing the directory, it has come to our attention that the current method of updating the directory (transfer list from the WPCSA) is not working! We have contacted the Society and this is changed. What we requested from the Society needed the approval of the Board of Directors of the WPCSA. They approved us getting pre-release stud books. I am afraid due to this, the directory will not be available until June 15th at the earliest. Since registrations for the last 24 months are most likely missing from the directory, we feel that it is best to delay publication. It is our decision to make sure that the directory is as accurate as possible. The next issue of the directory will be also available on disk in either MAC or IBM format. The MAC disk will be available for Works in a database format. The IBM formatted disk will be available in Microsoft Word for Windows 6.0 format. As a "computer nerd", I feel that this new service will be very important to many Cob owners because it will offer "computerized" Cob owners a better way search what bloodlines are available in the United States!

The members of the WPCSA AHSA Cob Development Committee for 1995 have been announced. Two members of the NACC "staff" have joined the Committee this year. I, Claudia Novak and Tracy Laufer (Ruth's other half!) are currently members of the Committee. The other names and addresses of members of this committee will be listed in a brief article about this committee.

On gold sanctioned and Nationally rated show: A definite YES, Cob classes should be required, No one will ever come if not "invited". Our numbers are growing every year. I feel the classes will fill. Classes can be grouped if entries are few - points can be awarded according to class size (1st. out of 1 or 2 doesn't mean much does it?) Maybe someone could write an article defining some of these terms for those NACC subscribers and Cob owners who are not active in any regional Welsh organization and therefore not familiar with WPCSA show rules and regulations: ie what does a Gold, Silver or Bronze sanction mean for a show? What is required to be a nationally rated show?

The AHSA Year End Award is a good idea, Aren't there 90 of us who would give \$10 each?

The Tour of Welsh Cob Studs in the UK. YES! I couldn't go in July but you can sign me up for the October trip. My husband & I only had time to visit Derwen and Fronarth last year. That one rainy day made me want more than ever to return and see more.

This leads me to suggest another possible article (or series of articles) on famous Cob bloodlines, foundation sires and dams. What are the different lines noted for? Some of the larger breeders and/or those who have been breeding Cobs for many years have a wealth of information, opinions and theories that the rest of us would love to hear or read about. Maybe a UK, Canadian or US judge would agree to write for us. Maybe you could feature a different author with each issue.

Another idea: When reporting show results: I am always interested in knowing how many entries in each class. As I mentioned before, 1st. out of 6 entries means a lot more than 1st. out of 1 or 2. It also tells me which shows offer more competition. The number could be put in parentheses after the class name.

Please ask correspondents to date their articles and or letter and then include these dates at the head of the piece. Many times, the news refers to a specific event or happening. Being a quarterly publication, it would be helpful to know when the correspondence was written.

Glenhaven (UK) will be represented at the 1995 Royal Welsh by the recently purchased stallion Derwen Traveling Express. The mare Derwen Pearl, also owned by Suzanne Glenn in the UK is due to Derwen Traveling Express in the spring.

Congratulations to Jim and Kristin Yeager of Utah on the purchase of Glenhaven Welsh Liberty and to Dr. Rick and Lisa Mogerma of Michigan on the purchase of Derwen Dashing Duke and Glenhaven Welsh Monterey. Glenhaven is retaining the colt foal Glenhaven Welsh Destiny as a stallion prospect.

Glenhaven is operating a full training and boarding facility at Norco which will provide a total

However, fate stepped in and now Smoke Tree Stella D will be heading to Wisconsin to Mary Jo Burmesch and Madoc Owen will be coming to Montana to Elise, who hopes to have him ready to show locally this summer. He will bridge the gap for riding, while the mares are with their foals and Scot is in training.

In time, we hope we can travel to some of the Welsh shows on the coast and the Western national, but for the time, the farm work makes it rather difficult - distances are so far. It is great that so many have phone about our Cobs and we have been pleased that a number of people have visited to see them.

In time, many things go through drastic

changes! Quite a kick to read in the last WPCSA Newsletter that in 1946 the Society reorganized, prepared a new corporation charter dropping the name of Cob "because it was agreed that the Cob is not an animal that would ever become popular in America; consequently it would be undesirable to permit crossing these large and heavy animals with the Mountain type Welsh Ponies"

Well, I still agree with the crossing of Cobs and Mountain ponies in most cases, and also agree that the time was not yet here for the acceptance of Welsh Cobs by most of the equestrians in America, but look what has happened nearly 50 years later. The Cob's time has come.

The greatest responsibility of breeders of Welsh Cobs now faces us (both here and abroad) Either over breeding or imprudent selection of breeding stock has slightly dampened the reputation of several of the most popular breeds of horses. Prediction of good performance still rides and drives with the Welsh Cob and it is our task to continue the predictability! This is the real challenge and satisfaction of breeding Welsh Cobs.

Most of our breeding stock is based on animals that were in Britain after WW2. Now the base has broadened, so we really need to sort out the qualities we want in our produce and find it without inbreeding. Line breeding and out cross requires study and I am excited with the more recent import of new lines. For some years, we were pretty restricted in bloodlines. Among the early Welsh Cob studs in Wales, for example, was Pauline Taylor at Llanarth. How I wonder how would have followed Meredith, Comet and Meteor. Len Bigley doubtless knew some of these plans and I watch to see the success of the Llanarth Cobs crossed with other lines. We can learn something using Llanarth as a model for your Cobs.

NACC has been a great resource, a legacy for Ann Lamb and Cindy Dishman. We are so fortunate that you are able to continue. The Welsh Cob isn't a mystery breed any longer.

In both cases her median scores were better than 66%.

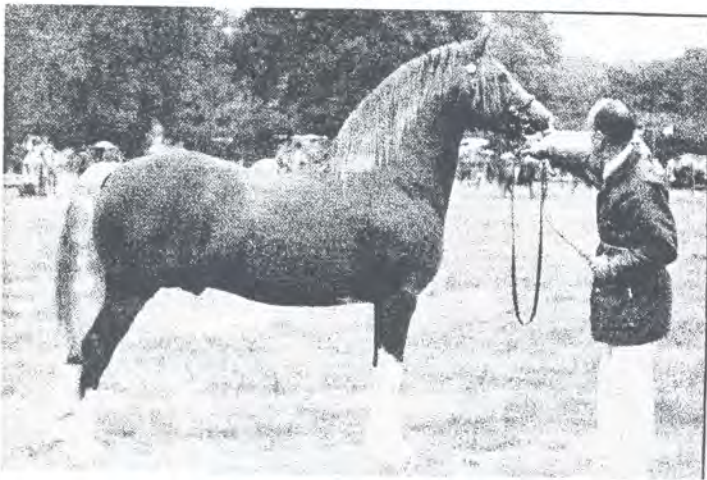

The Mane Event

When God was giving “manes” out to equines, he decided that Welsh ponies and Cobs should have plenty of them. Manes are a great place to catch burrs and other sticky things that need to be spread around the world. Manes are also great things to keep bugs from biting. And so it was decided!

According to our rules, Cobs may be shown with full, natural or evened manes. The term, “full, natural” is what is the downfall of many first time exhibitors. If you have a copy of the 1994 Welsh Pony and Cob Society of America yearbook, take a good look at the Royal Welsh winners. None of these animals look like they just walked in from the pasture with all the beautiful, natural mane that was given to them! “Natural” means what looks best on the animal. Take a very careful look at these pictures of how Welsh are presented by the best in the U.K..

A long mane can hide a beautiful throat latch and greatly shorten the look of a Cob's neck. In late winter or early spring, I take a careful look at my Cob's neck from the off side (the side without the mane). I carefully look at the strengths and weaknesses of the neck and shoulder. With careful pulling and thinning alot can be done to enhance the neck. First of all you want the mane a proper length by the throat latch. If you animal is a little cresty, you want the mane longer in this area. If your animal is a little fat in the withers, you want the mane a little

shorter. If they are knifey in the withers, a little longer. If they have a beautiful neck to shoulder transition, you want to show this off (short). If the animal's neck is a little upright you may want the mane longer. If the neck is shorter, you may want the mane shorter. Stallions can usually handle longer manes than mares. The mane should not be a short bushy thing. The length of the mane and the thickness are important and should be balanced. The line between the throat latch and withers should respond to the shape of the neck of the animal. All I can describe it in words, is a sweeping effect to bring the eye from the head to the withers. You want the mane to enhance the look of the animal.

This is not a project that can be done in one day. None of my animals are fond of having their manes ripped out! With a thinning knife, I shorten the mane to about one inch longer than my desired end product. A good thinning knife is a must. It does not leave that hated line that scissors leave. You start about two to three inches above the end line and saw down carefully. I always start at the withers and work up. For some reason animals don't mind you pulling out a few hairs far from their brains. On performance animals I have been know to pull more than a few hairs while riding. It is a kind of sneak attack! No matter what, I do the pulling slowly a few hairs at a time using my fingers going all the way to the roots. I am sure that many professional mane pullers may not agree with me but it is what works for me. I have found that many pulling combs have a way in my hands to chop the hair off at a short distance from roots leaving ugly short clumps!

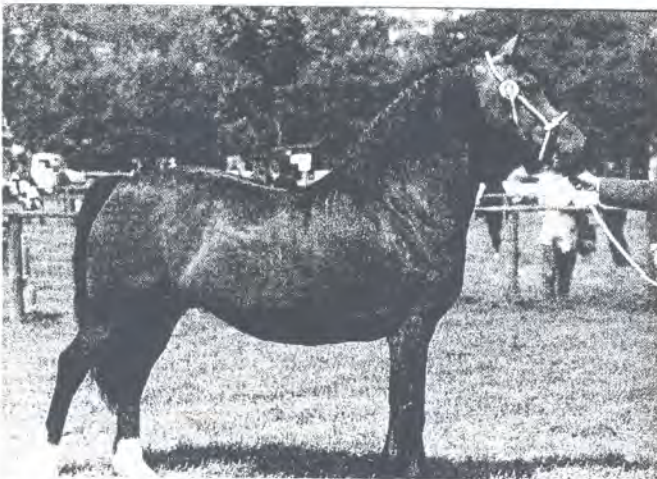
If you do not have the days and weeks to invest in a well pulled mane, I saw a great trick while at a pony hunter barn in Australia. The trainer had a pony mare with a very cresty neck, thick mane and that hated to be pulled. The only way the trainer could get the mane pulled was to tranquilize the animal. This is a valid option. Instead she parted the mane down the middle leaving hair on either side, she took the clippers and clipped a long oval out of the middle of the mane.

The Mane Event

This thinned the mane very effectively but is only successful if the mane is constantly kept clipped. Growing out can be a “ugly” spiked look for several months but it looks great while maintained.

The American standard “bridle path”, shaved with clippers is a quick way many use to show off the throat latch. I personally do not like the look of a shaved bridle path larger than the size of bridle headstall. Shaved bridle paths have a habit of getting larger and larger every time you clip. Arabs seem to have half their necks in bridle paths! The stubby short hairs of a bridle path growing out are a constant annoyance.

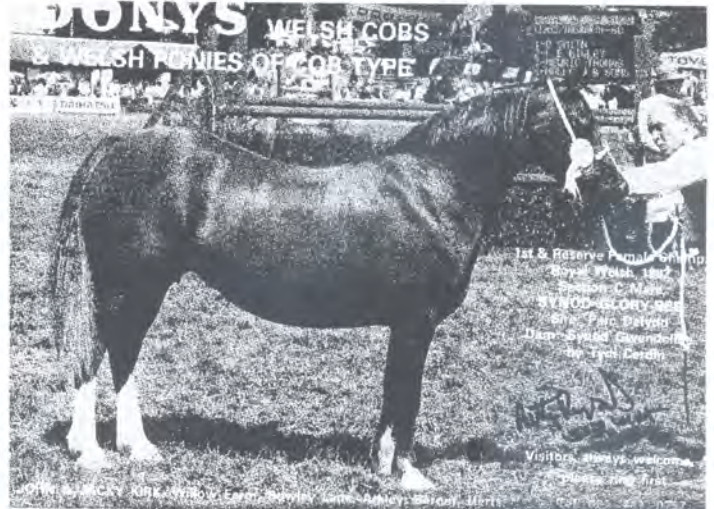
For a number of years, I have given up on this “shaved” look. I have found that a pulled and thinned mane is much easier to deal with. Several of my good driving ponies have NO bridle path. Why you may ask? A number of years ago at a famous driving event, one of my tiny headed Section B ponies shook her head hard enough to rid herself of the bugs swarming around her head and the bridle! Now all my driving animals have their bridles braided in by taking a small amount of forelock and bridle

path area braided together to form a lock on the headstall.

Certainly different parts of the United States and Canada have traditions on how the mane and tail appear in the show ring. I have shown three-gaited, five-gaited, roadsters, Arabs and hunters! Each has its different standard of presentation. Personally, I think that Cobs should be shown as close to the British standard as possible. This means that manes are pulled and shortened to an attractive length that enhances the beautiful length of rein and necks Cobs have. Tails are another article!

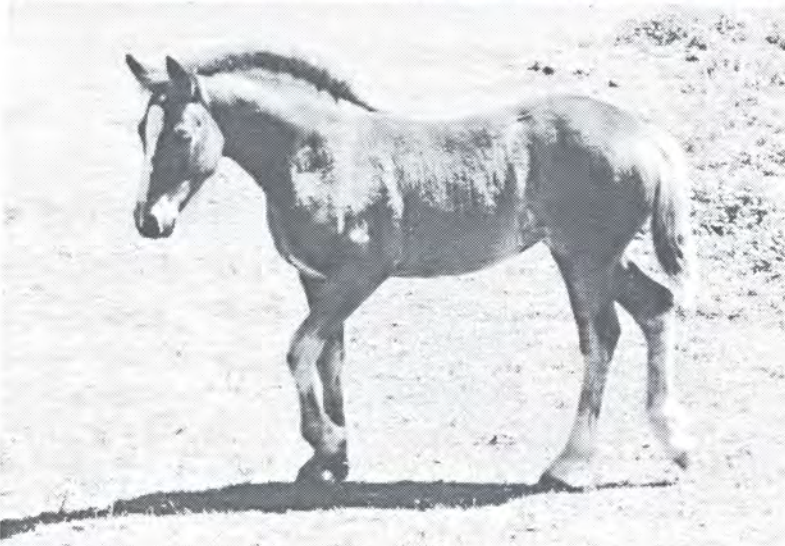

A H S A C o b D e v e l o p m e n t C o m m i t t e e

The AHSA Cob Development Committee was founded a number of years ago. Basically the purpose of the committee was to come up with Cob rules and get them in the AHSA rule book. Cob rules have been part of the AHSA rule book since about 1988. I am afraid that I can't remember the exact date. Being in the AHSA rule book is important because the published rules mean that we have American wide standards to show by. Since the inclusion of the rules there have been few changes. Basically, there have been few changes because in the past few Cob owners showed at AHSA rated shows!

I personally think that yearend AHSA awards are important. All Welsh yearend AHSA awards are for PERFORMANCE. We have one of the best performance breeds in the world and we should have all the recognition that we can get! Cobs are what the dressage people dream about owning. Cobs blow away all other breeds in harness. Why shouldn't we go to the largest conference and year awards ceremony for horse people in the WORLD and blow our horn!

The AHSA Cob Development Committee has been given the job of collecting statistics on whether or not there are enough Cob people in the United States to support an AHSA yearend award for COBS. Listen, they are not going to do it for 20 Cobs or 50 Cobs. We need at least 100 Cobs to be registered for yearend awards (\$150 for life time registration with AHSA). We need at least 6 to 8 performance Cobs to show up at each AHSA rated show. We also need at least 5 AHSA rated shows in the nation to offer Cob performance classes. As much as I personally feel strongly about the AHSA yearend awards, I think that it may be premature. I do not foresee the above mentioned needed numbers to convince the AHSA. I would like to be wrong on this one.

Currently we have fewer than 15 WPCSA

shows in the United States that offer Welsh Cob performance classes and halter classes. What we need to do is pressure every WPCSA sanctioned show to offer Cob classes. In the next two years we need show that we can "promise" every WPCSA show that offers Cob classes at least 3 animals in two and under, 3 in mares and 3 in stallion classes. Our performance classes will have to be 5 or **more**. I guess what I am saying is we have to **first** convince WPCSA shows that we are important to them! If we do this then getting an AHSA yearend award will be easy.

All of the committee members have a two page questionnaire for their region that needs to be completed. Contact your committee member for a copy to help them complete the questionnaire by the October 1, 1995 date. Responses must go to your regional representative since the committee does not want duplication of numbers.
