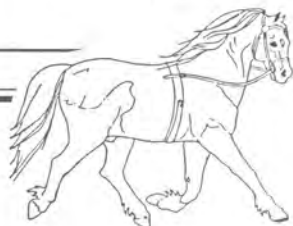

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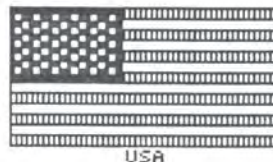
COBS CLAIM CHAMPIONSHIP

In a move unprecedented in West Coast Welsh history, Judge Gene Mickenham selected two Section D Cobs as her Supreme and Reserve Supreme Champions of the 1989 Welsh Pony & Cob Association of Washington All Breed Pony Extravaganza! *Lidgett Lady Rachel, an enormous three-year old bay mare, claimed the honors of Supreme of Show as well as Champion Cob Mare. Rachel is a recent addition to Holly Hill Welsh, owned by A.W.E. members Jacquie and Dave Moore of Snohomish, Washington. The Res. Supreme of Show went to *Brynarian Black Magic, the Champion Cob Stallion. This impressive black three-year old is herdsire for Cindy Dishman's Winterlake Welsh Cobs. Cindy is an A.W.E. director. Cindy and Jacquie were stabled next to each other and the air was full of high voltage celebrations when the winners returned to their stalls!

NEWS FROM THE U.S.



The Directors of the Welsh Pony and Cob Society of America decided at their June meeting to extend the Artificial Insemination program for an additional 5 years. It has been offered to members on a 3-year trial basis and the trial period was to expire this year. Currently there are only five Section C and D stallions approved for A.I. in this country with several more pending approval.

The cob population has taken a quantum leap this year in the Pacific Northwest with the addition of two mature animals and the births of 8 cob foals! Numbers almost doubled from 13 cobs ending the 1988 year within the states of Washington and Oregon, to 22 cobs and one Welsh Warmblood (Cob x TB cross) within the first 7 months of 1989. Nine of the additions are either weanlings or yearlings.

The new babies include a Sec. C colt by Sec. D **Brynarian Braint ap Maldwyn**, x **Catrina**, Sec. A, belonging to Ann Lamb, Avondale Farm. A black Sec. C filly with hind socks, **Wynsom's Magnificent Impression**, arrived to owner Barbara Wynn, Wynsom Welsh. "Maggie" is by **Brynarian Braint ap Maldwyn** x **Finally A Filly**, Sec. A. **Winterlake Alexander**, a 100% Sec. D bay colt by **Brynarian Black Magic** x ***Okeden Jolly** was born May 7 to owner Cindy Dishman. On May 1, Alexander's half-brother, a chestnut Sec. C colt with star, blaze and 3 socks by **Brynarian Black Magic** x **Kelvin Hoodoo**, Sec. A, arrived. These foals are the first foals produced by Winterlake Welsh Cob Farm. Glenna Nickelson became a first-time cob owner with the very recent arrival of a colt foal. **NPF Heritage** ("Henry") is by **Brynarian Braint ap Maldwyn** and out of Glenna's Sec. B mare, **Gallifrey's Tea & Roses**.

The two "new" mature animals to the Pacific Northwest arrived July 10 at Holly Hill Welsh Farm to the delight of owner Jacquie Moore. ***Lidgett's Lady Rachel** made the longest trip having been purchased from the farm of Suzy Schockett in Martha's Vineyard. Rachel is a 3-year bay 100% Sec. D mare. The other mare, **Madoc's Princess Ann** is a 2-year old striking palomino with blaze and 4 stockings traveling from Mary Alice William's Madoc Farm in Texas.

May 20 marked the arrival of Oregon's first Cob/Thoroughbred cross. **Midnight Matinee** came into the world at . . . (any guesses anyone?) . . . midnight, of course. "Mattie" was born to a 15.2 h.h. T.B., **Forward Lady** and sired by Section D Cob **Brynarian Black Magic**. Owned by Janet Heard and Jocelyn Wright, Mattie is a bay with a star.

Ray and Shirley Freschi paid a visit to the Dishmans Winterlake Farm on July 1. The Freschis were enroute to Canada on a 2-week vacation and decided to stop to meet Bill and Cindy and to see their cobs. Having lost one of their geldings

from their international champion pair of imported Welsh Cobs, they were interested in finding a replacement that could also double as a saddle horse for Shirley. (See NACC, Winter '89 for their story.) Their requirements for a Cob are very specific: it must be a black gelding in the neighborhood of 15.2 h.h., be at least 5 years and well trained in driving. After looking at the cobs, Ray pulled out some photos showing his Cob team and Percheron team. They own 12 driving vehicles including a huge flatbed wagon used on picnic drives and a wedding carriage, which Ray occasionally hires out. The Freschi's next stop was to take them to visit Ann Bartel whose company produces Webfoot driving vehicles.

John and Ann Lamb have moved their Avondale Farm to a new location about 20 minutes from their previous Redmond address. Their new farm of 20 acres is the perfect place to continue raising ponies and cobs as the property is completely fenced and has a very nice barn. Their new home is HUGE (and even sports an indoor swimming pool). It was a very generous gesture for Ann to invite a group of Oregon's All Welsh Enthusiast club members to stay with them during the weekend of Washington's Welsh Extravaganza Show. The first evening on which company arrived turned out to be John and Ann's first night in their new home! Despite the move, the show and the guests, Ann pulled it off beautifully and there was even time to admire the mares which had already made the move. Cobs **Brynarian Morwena** and **Avondale Special Favor** displayed their beautiful reaching trots and very sweet nature.

Tiffany Moulton, an 11-year old equestrienne from Lincoln, California is the new owner of **Yonder Farms Bandwagon**, a cob mare, who was purchased from Chris and Gay Radovich.

Sarajane Valcheck has sold her cob gelding, ***Sydenham Lark** to Aaron and Shirley Ferer of Hillsborough, California.

***Llanarth Rhonwen** has been sold by Mrs. Polly Swinerton, Mary's Farm, to Pat Holmes of Woodside, California. Pat purchased Rhonwen's 1988 filly foal and owns the Sec. D stallion **Cyffylliog Pendefig**.

A telephone call from Stephanie Abronson verified the tip NACC received from Keith Parsons earlier this year. Two Derwen foals were imported to Los Angeles in December of '88. They comprise a filly and a black colt and are owned by Suzanne & Owen Glen formerly of Australia. The Glens now reside in Rolling Hills, California.

To All Cob Breeders:

The 1989 Royal Agricultural Winter Fair will definitely have two line classes for Welsh Ponies of Cob Type and Welsh Cobs. The two sections will be combined as follows: Welsh Section C & D. 1st class: Colt, Filly or Gelding, 2 years old and under (prize money & ribbons) 2nd class: Stallion, Mare or Gelding, 3 years old and over (prize money & ribbons). Prize money will be given to 5th place. There may be pleasure driving classes for all sections, ladies and gentlemen to drive. As per my letter of Feb 8/89 we are still looking for donations for prize money and for those interested in showing a commitment to attend the RAWF in Toronto. Show dates are **November 8-19/89; the Welsh will most likely show November 17**. The Judge is Mrs. J. Lutey of the Trevarth Stud, breeder of Welsh ponies and cobs from Newquay, Cornwall.

At present I have a commitment of prize money totalling \$300 Canadian and I would like to thank those who have already given me their support.

Remember this is a start. If we can get a minimum of 6 entries this first year, next year could be even bigger and better. The Royal Winter Fair is one of the best shows in Canada. **PLEASE NOTE WE ARE LOOKING FOR SIX ENTRIES PER CLASS**. We have had response from the States which is super. I know it's early but we need Cob enthusiasts' input to ensure the Welsh Division is a bigger success.

There will be a Champion Cob & Reserve who will go up against the Champion Section A & B's for the Welsh Pony & Cob Society Perpetual Trophy donated to the Royal by the British Society.

In my letter of Feb 8/89 I mentioned that the Royal will most likely request information that the entries have exhibited at a minimum of 3 shows during the current year. It is possible this stipulation will not be enforced, however to be safe, you can request qualifying entry forms from the Ontario Agricultural Society offices or will be mailed upon request from the Royal.

“Welsh Cob Blood Takes Horses to the Top”

The influence of Welsh blood on the pony population of Britain is well known; indeed, children's riding and working hunter pony classes and private driving classes would be virtually empty were Welsh ponies or part-bred ponies excluded. What is often not appreciated is the equally important influence the Welsh breeds have had on the horse population, such as the ridden hunters, show jumpers, eventers and internationally successful driving horses.

Pioneers in the breeding of Welsh part-bred horses were Lt. Col. and Mrs. Ivor Reeves of Moreton-in-Marsh, Glos. In 1958, Mrs. Reeves purchased the lovely 16-year old chestnut Welsh Cob mare, Camp Polly, whose pedigree contained so many of the famous names of the breed back to the beginning of the Welsh Stud Book.

The following year Camp Polly was served by the H.I.S. stallion, Question, and produced the well-known M'Dear, whose progeny by Thoroughbred sires have made great names for themselves, e.g. Bee's Wax, by the H.I.S. stallion Flying Bee won many awards in Welsh part-bred and led hunter classes.

Entry to the Welsh part-bred register is gained by having 25 per cent registered Welsh blood, not necessarily one grandparent; it can be totalled up from any combination to total 25 percent.

M'Dear, now 21, is in foal to the H.I.S. stallion Ranig Pass. Her 1980 foal by Goldfella was last year's reserve champion foal at the H.I.S. Show.

Having had so much initial success with the Thoroughbred sire and Welsh Cob dam cross, Mrs. Reeves in 1962 purchased the Welsh part-bred mare Heather, by **Avaunt** (G.S.D.) out of the Welsh Cob mare **Hafrena Queen** by Llanarth Braint.

At the same time as M'Dear produced Bee's Wax by Flying Bee, Heather produced Bee's Wing by the same sire, who won his two-year-old class at the H.I.S. Show. Having been hunted by Col. and Mrs. Reeves, Bee's Wing was sold in 1977 to David Tatlow, who sold him on to Ted Edgar. Re-named Everest Jet Lag, during 1978 he won the Walwyn Championship at Royal Windsor and the Schroder Life jockey's event at the Horse of the Year Show. His 1980 wins included Birmingham, ridden by Nick Skelton, and to quote Ted Edgar: "You can put your grandmother on his back and he will safely give her a clear round!"

Col. and Mrs. Reeves also experimented with producing the Welsh part-bred hunter by starting the other way round, i.e. with a Thoroughbred mare covered with a Welsh Cob stallion, and found the end product to be even more successful.

After covering their mare Pleasant Fancy (G.S.B.) in 1965 with the Welsh Cob stallion Llanarth Brummel, Palm Fancy was duly produced and she, put to Thoroughbreds, has produced a whole host of notable in-hand and performance winners including The Prince (who stands over 17 hands and it is hoped will make a Badminton competitor): Game Fair, who again measured over 17 hands and was sold to Switzerland for a high figure, and Palm Fair, amongst whose many wins in-hand were champion two-year-old at the Shropshire and West Midland and the overall championship at the North Bucks Show.

Besides this success using Miss Wheatcroft's Llanarth Brummel, Col. and Mrs. Reeves have also used the same owner's Parc Brigadier, who set up the record Welsh Cob auction price of 3,000 guineas at the 1980 Llanarth Sale.

In 1980 they had three foals by Parc Brigadier, encouraged by the many successes of their two-year-old High Park, daughter of Brigadier from the G.S.B. mare Flying High, who won her yearling class at the Royal and was placed several times in hunter classes at county shows, winning at the Bucks Country and also being champion Welsh part-bred and reserve supreme champion at Northleach.

Col. and Mrs. Reeves are convinced that in the three-quarter Thoroughbred, quarter Welsh Cob cross they have produced the ideal horse, with kindly temperament, ample quality with courage and staying power, capable of carrying a rider all day over any country.

Another which has made a great name for himself in dressage is the half-Thoroughbred, half-Welsh Cob, Okeden Yeoman, bred by Dr. June Alexander in North Humberside.

At the 1969 Catterick stallion parade, Dr. Alexander heard Mrs. Yeomans, in her informative commentary describe the Welsh Cob stallion Llanarth Rhys as a very suitable type to cross with Thoroughbred mares. Dr. Alexander had a 15 hands 1 in. Thoroughbred mare, Madame Telstar and she took Mrs. Yeoman's advice and sent her to Llanarth Rhys, then standing at Mrs. Dale's Scole Stud in Edinburgh. The colt foal was named Okeden Yeoman (after Mrs. Yeomans) and when he won the Riding Club Dressage Championship at Stoneleigh as a five year-old it was realized that here was a horse with tremendous potential.

Ridden by Dr. Alexander's friend, Mrs. Lisa Wood, Yeoman has graduated to become one of the few Grand Prix dressage horses in the country.

Having both sire and dam standing at around 15 hands and himself growing to 16 hands 3 in., it was interesting to see whether this achievement could be repeated, so in 1978 (with both parent in their 20th year), Madame Telstar again visited Llanarth Rhys. The result was Okeden Monarch, and he again looks as if he will mature well over 16 hands. He was placed

in a large class of hunter yearling at Newark.

Lest the impression is given that Welsh part-bred horses are bred only outside the Principality, mention must be made of the successful Welsh Cob crosses bred at Llanarth Stud by Mrs. Ann Bigley.

Miss Taylor had put one of her best Welsh Cob mares, Llanarth Ebony, by Llanarth Braint, in foal to the Thoroughbred Nerium, and the resulting filly, Llanarth Nerissa, was given to Ann and Len Bigley on the occasion of their marriage.

The 1977 foal, Daisy Hill, was by the premium stallion Hill Farmer. Sold as two-year-old to Mr. and Mrs. Colin Trembath of Horsham, she took the show ring by storm in 1980, winning the championship for hunter fillies at the East of England and, the highlight of the year for her, the Walker Okeover Cup for the best filly at the H.I.S. Show.

Nerissa's 1978 foal was Maritime by Marine Corps, who was sold at the 1979 H.I.S. Hereford Sale (highest-priced yearling) to Mr. Geoffrey Buckingham Bawden, and she again has been successful in the show ring at county level; e.g. champion hunter at the 1980 Stafford County Show. The third filly, Magical Air, foaled in 1980 by Current Magic has been retained at Llanarth, and Nerissa is again in foal to Current Magic.

The achievement of the Welsh Cob and Welsh part-bred Cob in long distance rides are well-known, so many of them being successful in the B.H.S. Welsh Mountains 100-mile ride.

Championship honours of the Welsh Pony and Cob Society performance competition for this category were shared between Mrs. Mary Cranfield's pure-bred Coxwold Blue Grouse, an exceptionally active mare despite her 15 years, and the Welsh part-bred mare Glasmynydd Honey, ridden by Mrs. Betty French, who is herself a great-grand mother and vet completed both a 100-mile and 80-mile ride culminating in a gold medal award at the Welsh Mountains event. Mrs. Atfield's part-bred mare, Sydenhurst Erica, was one of the winning British team in the European 100-mile ride; she was fourth overall for the whole of Europe and won the prize for the fittest competitor.

As harness animals, Welsh Cobs and cross-breds have held their own for centuries, many owners in the last century having printed on their stud cards challenges to compete "against all comers", with wagers varying from foals to American show buggies!

Mr. George Bowman first became National Driving Champion in 1974 with four pure-bred Welsh Cobs, and with various Cobs and part-breds he repeated the championships in 1975-79, with the individual silver and team gold medal in the 1980 World Driving Championships.

His current team is made up of four Welsh part-breds: Bill, Marmaduke, Dill (named after his breeder, Mr. Dill Thomas of Neath, former owner of the legendary stallion Llwynog-y-Garth) and Chocolate Soldier, who is a pure-bred Welsh Cob registered under the name of Lockeridge Questor.

Mr. Bowman recently bought from Mr. David Cripps a very big black two-year-old Welsh Cob colt (by Parc Brigadier—Tyhen Dainty), which he intends to use on Hungarian mares to produce his driving teams of the future.

With so many successes in so many diverse fields, and some exciting new prospects being opened up in the near future—such as H.I.S. premiums being offered to suitable Welsh Cob stallions—it looks as if the Welsh Cob part-bred horse is on the threshold of a new era. Also, in these days of ever-increasing feed costs, hardiness is of prime importance and even a small proportion of native blood produces a large difference in the feed bill.

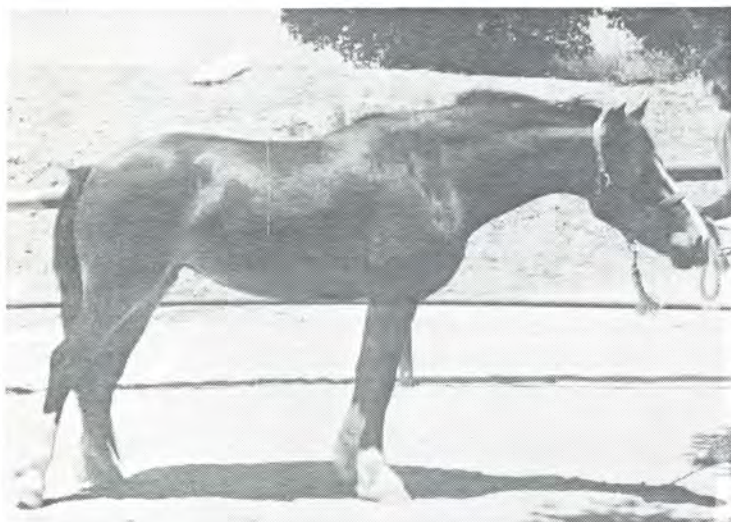


Welsh Warmblood Filly, **Midnight Matinee** (Brynarian Black Magic x **Forward Lady**, TB)

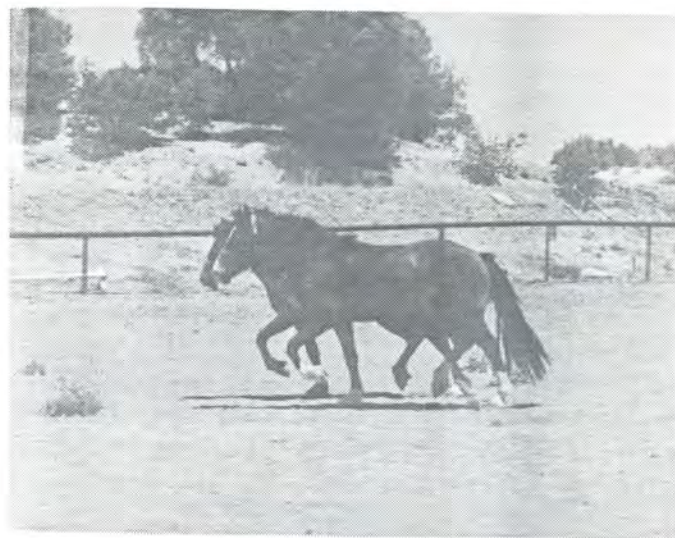

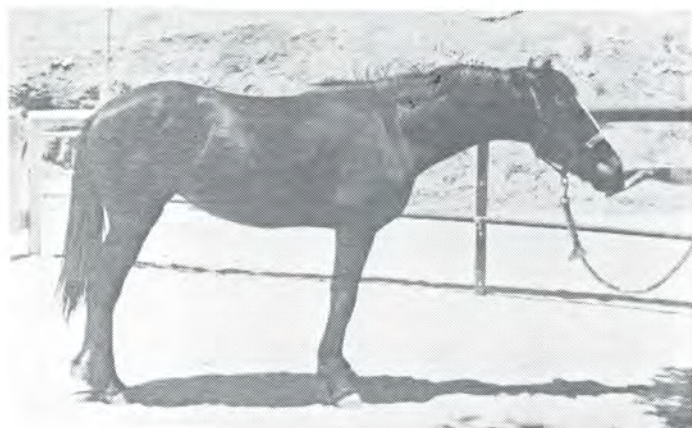

WELSH CAN DO IT!

By Ann Fisher

Welsh ponies and cobs are just as adept in performing dressage movements as the European Warmbloods, fancy Thoroughbreds or any of the other breeds frequently seen in the dressage arena. Their trot can float across the diagonal—their canter can be executed with cadence in the corners as well as on 10 meter circles—piaffe and passage can be in rhythm to classical music. Welsh can perform all the movements with ease and class any rider can be proud of! In my opinion Welsh are not only willing and obedient, but “naturals” for dressage because they are balanced in both body and soul.

Dressage is no easy task and is not to be taken lightly if one wants to do it correctly. It requires a preciseness and exactness demanded by perfection. Each movement at one time and each problem that arises must be worked out completely and overcome before going on to the next step, or serious repercussions will occur. Each test becomes more demanding, providing a new set of frustrations for mount and rider.

Dressage should never be forced or quick fixes employed. The rider must convince his mount that he (the animal) wants to execute whatever is requested within the horse's limits. New steps are to be started with prudence and asked for with little steps.

If things become forced or punishments become too often, the mount develops resentment and will always be on the defensive. There is no joy for horse or rider to work together in the negative.

Because of the demands inherent in Dressage, a horse or pony that is sensible and sensitive—to match a sensible and sensitive rider—is best suited. The rider must have a positive attitude as the horse and rider become one. A personality that is boisterous or the sort one might call “show off” and short tempers will find much difficulties in succeeding in Dressage. In my opinion, dressage is much more than the training of a horse for it is also the training of the rider's skills and character creating a duo that works together.

Hard work and tedious repetitions will eventually give successful results. Competitive or classical dressage riders demand improvement of themselves and their animals since the desire for constant improvement is critical and dressage is based on continuous learning and understood communication.

At the competitions it is not who you might defeat but your own scores that count. A 60% might give extreme differences in placings. The important task is to carefully study the test results, the comments made by the judges and to learn from those, so when you return for other competitions it will be possible to see improvements. I found most judges to be very fair and helpful with their comments and in scoring were most generous. With many schooling shows available throughout the U.S. it is wiser for the beginner or young horse to get started before entering recognized shows.

Particularly intelligent horses often figure out that the rider is not about to argue with a slight disobedience for fear of spoiling the entire movement and our cob stallion, Lockeridge Waterloo, is no exception. He had it down pat that he would have his time in the show ring, not always go forward upon our trotting up the center line to X or give a joyful buck on a circle. It took a few schooling shows to convince him that he did not have the entire show to himself and that his rider had something to say about what was to happen in the competition ring.

So my friends with ponies and cobs, do not hesitate to become involved in dressage. Size of mount gives no advantage or disadvantage. In the future, I hope to see many more Welsh at dressage shows. Yes, it is hard work, but what pleasure one derives from being ONE with the cob I so love and respect. It is a privilege to dance with such a partner because *Welsh can do it!*

INTERNATIONAL SPORHORSE REGISTRY MARES AND FOALS

The Spring issue of NACC included a complete list of registration rules for stallions in the International Sporthorse Registry (ISR). This article will summarize the requirements to register mares and foals in the same.

Mares

The principal criterias of evaluation for mares are the following:

1. Quality of conformation: head, neck, saddle position/shoulder, frame/top line, forehead, hindquarter;
2. Breed and sex type;
3. Correctness of the gaits;
4. Impulsion, swing and elasticity of the gaits;
5. Overall impression and development as related to age. Scoring is done on the basis of 1 to 10.

Performance Testing for Mares is undertaken during one day:

1. Judging the basic gaits, walk, trot and canter under saddle with any rider and during the mare is turned loose in an indoor ring (30% of final score)
2. Judging of the rideability under saddle with one or more testing riders appointed by the ISR. (30% of final score)
3. Free jumping, individually over fences in an indoor arena. (30%)
4. Behaviour, character and temperament during the test will be judged. (10%)

The Mare Performance Testing can also be achieved by obtaining a first, second or third place in five competitions recognized by the AHSA. These competitions must be:

- in dressage second level or higher with minimum scores of 55%
- in jumping preliminary jumper or higher
- in three-day eventing training level or higher

Foals

In order to receive registration papers each foal:

- must be presented to the ISR judges
- must be out of a mare entered into one of the ISR Mare Books or eligible to be entered into one of it
- must be from a Certified, Licensed or Approved Breeding Stallion

In addition to the rules above, yearlings and older offspring must fulfill the following requirements:

- bloodtyping must be provided for proof of parentage

Excerpts from Eventing February 1987 "TO BREED A BRITISH EVENT HORSE" By Hilary Legard

I was reminded of the endless controversy over whether breeding or environment exerts the greatest influence on a horse's ability by whoever it was who wrote "Some 'horses' are born great, some achieve greatness, and some have greatness thrust upon them". Anyway, it prompted me to renew an interest in the breeding and subsequent promotion of British competition horses—a neglected subject here in Britain.

The origins of British Event horses are certainly mixed, and success comes in a variety of breed combinations. How many is not recorded, and details of breeding, particularly on the dam's side are limited, although stallions are generally more easily traced.

The Thoroughbred is the major contributor to Event horse breeding in Britain. Bolebec Miler by Hardiran out of Lady Mantle (Grey Love) owned by Mrs. Shirley Marler and bred by Mrs. Hanks; Distinctive by Don Carlos owned by Captain Mark Phillips, are just two examples from a long list of successful clean bred horses. A Thoroughbred can be put to any number of a variety of other breeds/types to produce very successful Event horses, for example, Lady Colthurst's Wily Woodpeck by Blackbird out of an Irish Draught, or Dunit, a three-quarter bred (by Calgary Gold out of a half bred mare with Irish Draught in her blood), ridden by David Green. The Thoroughbred Connemara cross has produced horses such as Tweseldown Monopoly, Goldcrest and Madeleine Gurdon's The Done Thing who is by Mossy Face out of a Connemara/Welsh Cob Mare and bred by Charlie Edwards. The Welsh Cob mix has proved successful, with many good horses, for instance Jon Evans' The Cordwainer who is a three quarter bred by Past Petition out of a half bred Welsh Cob mare.

An Event horse needs to be an all round athlete; a bold, intelligent horse with speed, stamina and above all a fluent jump. Horses like the Welsh Cob and the Irish Draught are natural, athletic jumpers, and there is a strong indication that jumping ability is a significantly heritable trait—inherited through amongst other things, temperament development and shape of skeletal muscles and nervous input. Therefore using proven horses or their near relatives for breeding looks to be a realistic prospect. With breeding it needs to be taken into account that a foal inherits not only from its parents, but also grandparents and further back still, but with decreasing influence.

The thought of participating in a Dressage show may be quite intimidating. It's a good idea to attend a show first as an observer or a groom for a friend to see what really happens before entering. A schooling Dressage show is a less stressful way to introduce your horse, yourself and your training goals. Even if you are not ready for a First Level Test, some schooling shows offer two classes for the animal/rider just getting started in dressage. They are listed as a Walk Trot Test and Dressage Suitability. The pattern for the Walk Trot Test is simple, short and is usually the first class of the day. The Dressage Suitability class groups all the animals together in the ring at the same time, much like a Pleasure Class. The judge asks for a walk, sitting trot, working trot rising and canter. Animals that are entered in Walk Trot and/or the suitability class may also enter other more advanced tests. The test below shows how simple the exercise is. Late entries to Dressage Shows are discouraged or prohibited.

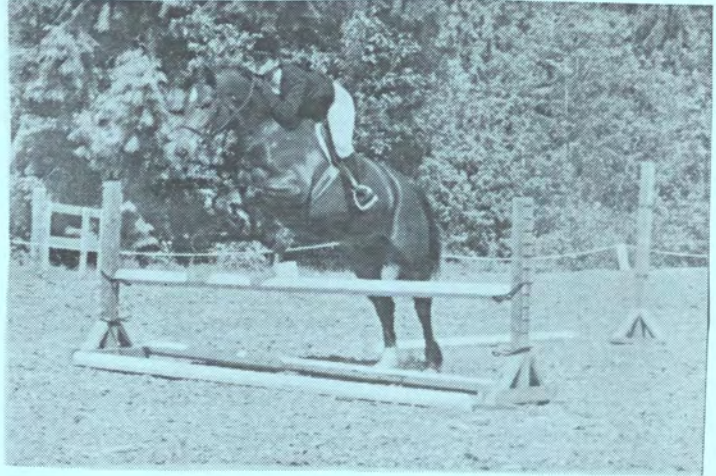
