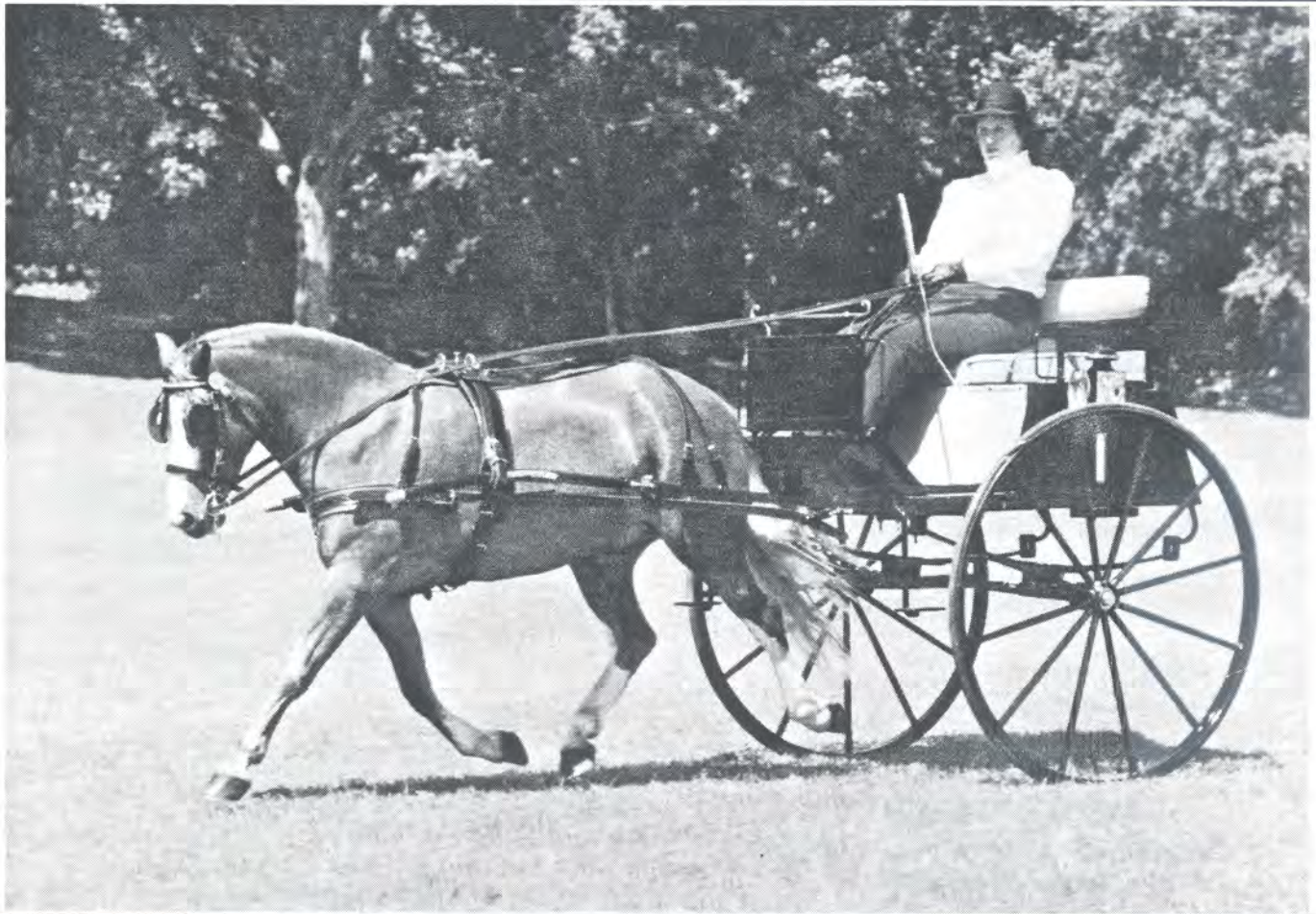

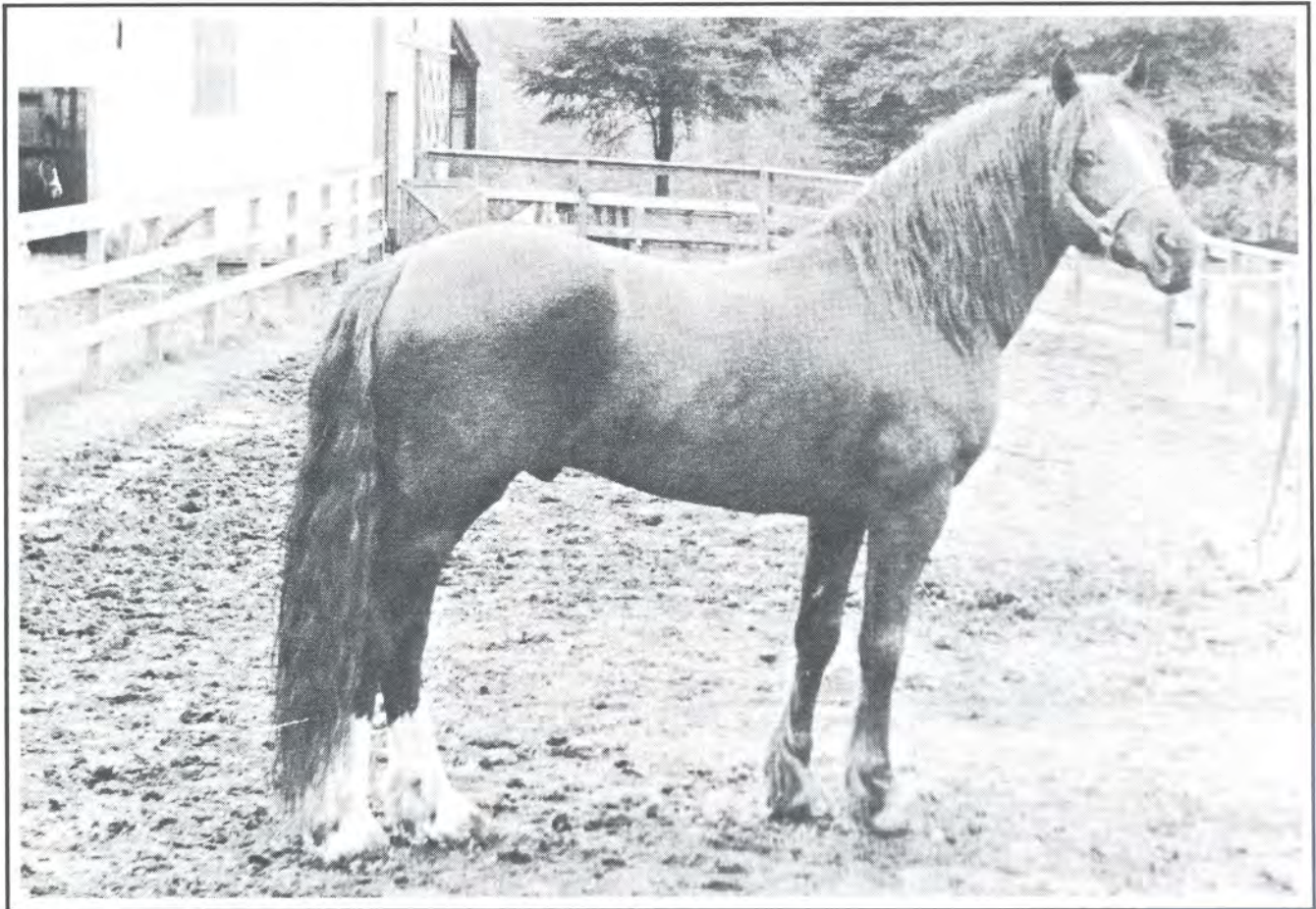

YOUR RESPONSE HAS BEEN TERRIFIC!

In the Spring issue of NACC we told you that many subscribers have been reporting many inquiries for Welsh Cobs, and we have certainly been getting them ourselves as well. Many inquiries are stimulated by articles about Cobs in general circulation magazines like last July's *Country Journal*, and in horse magazines, such as an upcoming Fall issue of *Horse Illustrated*. You yourselves stimulate many questions when you take your Cobs to horse shows and other exhibitions. The problem is, there is often a mismatch between what you have for sale at the moment and what the buyer is looking for. We know of several potential buyers who were discouraged by not finding the right

Cob for their needs and went to another, more easily available breed. Too bad for our favorite breed, especially since one Cob is often not enough, when you get to know them.

So here is NACC's solution, and we certainly appreciate your excellent response to our request for contributions, to a compact, easy-to-copy list of the Welsh Cobs and Welsh Warmbloods which are available at this time. So instead of having to search through piles of back issues of NACC, *Welsh Roundabout* or the national newsletters to try to find something suitable, you'll find many choices right here. A brief survey of the 78 entries on the list showed 14 geldings, 39 mares and 39 stallions. Thirty-three of these were yearlings or 1991 foals. This means that there are at least 45 Cobs available right now which are old enough to train and/or use, and many have considerable training, showing or breeding records. There is also a wide range of prices to select from.

We hope you'll let us know if you like the idea and would like us to continue it. We'll know you are encouraging us if you send us your listings, complete with price and training (if old enough to train). We feel that including the price will help, because buyers can "pre-qualify" themselves, as one does when shopping for real estate. We'd also like to hear from you as to whether this list helps you sell a Cob or to find the right one for you. *Please send your listings to Ann Lamb 12534 - 277th Pl. N.E., Duwall, WA 98019, by October 1 for the Fall issue.*

I enclose my check for subscription renewal and cost of full page advert. Hope it's correct!!! I also enclose some photos of Brenin (*LEYESWICK BRENNIN) on grass at Indio Desert Dressage Festival and ridden by a 9 year old. Also, you can see my news—I

actually have a D x D filly foal—I believe it's the very first in Southern California; perhaps someone can let me know. Later on this year, MARY'S LLANCES sister, MARY'S BRONWYN is due to produce a foal also by Brenin. That should be interesting.

I enclose a copy of a letter I sent to Santa Lucia Welsh Assoc. Do you have problems with the A & B people up your way? I still cannot get them to accept us and this year with all the babies, we will have 13 pure cobs. We do all need to pull together for the Welsh breed or have you all split off? What about the main body in America? The worst seems to be the AHSA rules that segregate the Welsh and Juniors from adults. Where there are so few of us, we don't need the split. Some, like the Santa Lucia Welsh, are using the AHSA rules against the breed, i.e. the show is not affiliated but they print on the bottom AHSA ground rules adhered to. Their class list had no classes for cobs and simply had Reg. Welsh Stallions, Mares or Gelding classes and then two non-Welsh. Also, either registered Welsh or Open Classes for performance. They said we could not enter any registered Welsh classes—only the non-Welsh halter or Open classes. How do other people with cobs feel? Or do they just ignore the Welsh breeding and GO to open shows? I'm curious to know if I'm just bashing my head against a brick wall trying to preserve the Welsh breed in its entirety?!!!!?

Hi! Just a short note on what's up with Coblynau Stud in 1991. COBLYNAU CARIDWEN & CARMATHEN have both been sold to Danina Leyson in Quebec, ownership transferred May 1991. Both animals are by DERWEN

REALITY out of DYFNOG VALIANT VIXEN.

We have one new offspring this year—a colt born June 2, colour at birth, Black; small star, 3 white socks (2 front, 1 hind). The colour may change. Sire: Derwen Reality. Dam: Penlon Iris. the colt's registered name will be COBLYNAU CWMBRAN. Translation: Valley of the Dark River, in Welsh. this colt is very bold, only 3 days old, but already checking everything out. His mom is always after him to stay close. This fine fellow will be offered for sale at weaning.

Reality has a few mares lined up to be bred: 3 Thoroughbreds and 2 Welsh Cobs. Other news: The first cob show of the season was held at Schonberg May 24 & 25. The line classes were 2 and under: no entries; 3 and over: 4 entries. The entries were DYFNOG VALIANT VIXEN, KENTCHURCH RUSTLER, BRYNARIAN EIDDWEN COMET, PENRHYN GWENDOLINE. The animals were placed in this order by the judge, Liz Redshaw of the Colwyn Stud. Champion Cob was DYFNOG VALIANT VIXEN; Reserve, KENTCHURCH RUSTLER.

A very interesting point: BRYNARIAN EIDDWEN COMET traveled from Saskatchewan with his owner, Nita Wilson to come to the Can-Am. Driving Trails held a week before Schonberg. Nita felt that with the many shows here, he should have his chance in competing in everything. I'm sorry I don't have results of the Open Driving, but I believe Comet did well. Bravo Nita and Comet!

The other shows that we have cob classes are the Pony Breeders, All-Welsh and the Royal Winter Fair in the Toronto area. Mr. Sam Morgan of the Parc Stud will be judging the line classes at the Royal and I believe Mrs. Cynthia Hayden will be officiating at the Performance classes.

The only offspring of SYNOD RHUBAN COCH, a colt named

LYNTON TRUE BRITON (Sire: PARC DILWYN) was sold by Ray Morrison to local horsewoman-trainer Sara Gordon. Briton has been gelded and will soon be out performing. This lad is very much like his dam. Pity she's gone.

UNITED STATES

Wagon Train Camp Meeting '91 with the handicapped attracted a large number of participants to the Winkleman Farm the fourth Saturday of June. Despite threatening skies, everyone had an opportunity to drive a team of Welsh ponies pulling farm equipment, to eat an Indian chapati, to drink some fresh cow's milk and to visit all the farm animals. The theme of the meeting was from I Thessalonians 5:11, "Encourage one another."

STORK REPORTS

JAYCOBS FARM, Northridge, California, announces the arrival of their first D x D filly, JAYCOBS TWSYSOGES CARIAD. Born May 2 of this year, this little bay lass sports a bold star and white on her legs. Her sire is the accomplished *LEYESWICK BRENIN out of MARY'S LLANCES.

Three '91 foals all arrived within 2 weeks at Winterlake Farm the end of May and early June and all sired by Sec. D BRYNARIAN BLACK MAGIC. First to arrive was WINTERLAKE CATRIN, a D x D liver chestnut FILLY (that was a relief; I was thinking of changing the farm name to BOYS R US) out of MADOC PRINCESS ANNE. "Cat" acquired several names along the way. On her first day of life moving out into the pasture, she earned the nickname "Pacing Peggy." Then she learned to walk and trot properly. On her second day of life she would walk straight away from Mom to investigate EVERYTHING, especially people, hence the nickname Curious George...ette. On her third day of life, it occurred to me there was BOUND to be a colt to follow, and the duo could be named Cathy Lee and Regis. Finally, "Catrin" was settled upon and stuck. Second to arrive was WINTERLAKE DUNCAN—a second bay colt out of Sec. D *Okeden Jolly. This very compact handsome guy has a star and white on all fours. And doing it her way, in her own time was Canadian Sporthorse Iraway's Aphrodite. Now this mare was in and out of labor for 3 weeks and I was convinced she would be the first to foal. Hah! In my face! She was the last to foal. The wait was well worth it. WINTERLAKE EXCALIBUR, a black Welsh Warmblood has two very short hind socks and looks like he'll make 15.2+.

Across town Winburn Farms was pleased to welcome their farm's first foal—another Brynarian Black Magic daughter, this one out of chestnut hunter/event mare, MARY'S MEGAN, owned by Heather Winburn. The filly, named MAID MARION has been delighting all family members with her very sweet nature and penchant for a vigorous flying trot.

UNITED KINGDOM

The arrival of the June/July issue of CARRIAGE DRIVING revealed the following tidbits from the British driving scene.

"Mary Matthews, who finished in second place in the International Horse Pairs class at the Brighton Driving Trials in May, with her pair of black cobs, is on the long-list for consideration for a place on the British team at the World Championships to be held in Austria in September. (Go-o-o-o Mary! Can anyone tell us more about her black cobs? —CD)

The Seacliff Horse Driving Trials lived up to its long-standing reputation as one of the most popular and enjoyable FEI driving events in the calendar. It was expertly organised, as always, by Gladys Dale at the Scoughall Estate in North Berwick, and run under the auspices of the East of Scotland Carriage Driving Association.

It was consequently most appropriate that many of the classes in the two day driving trials were dominated by the Welsh breed of horses and ponies that Gladys Dale has done so much to promote.

Faith Szezuka and her experienced Welsh section C gelding, JUST WILLIAM won the Open Single Pony class after a storming round on the cross-country marathon. Faith drew level with the leader in the dressage, Ian Bertram and his very successful Welsh Section D stallion PARKSIDE LLEWELLYN, a drove a well-timed double clear round in the cone driving to win the class.

The Seacliff Driving Trials held the first Lexus Novice qualifiers of the season and the top drivers in the two novice classes will go forward to compete in the Lexus National Championships at Windsor in August. Second in the Novice Pony class was John Walton with his Welsh Section C mare TALLINN APRIL and Tracy Douglas, third with her Welsh pony LEYESWICK GWALI AWEN.

The Novice Horse class included a third place win by Kate Murray driving her Hackney cross Welsh gelding, RULEWATER KINGSLEY and Susan Henry in fourth with her Welsh cob cross SAM.

In the Pony Pairs class, the current National Champion Jill Holah gave a textbook display of driving with her well-schooled Welsh Section C and part-bred geldings ROUND BUSH SIRIUS and BRIES COMMODORE to win with style.

PROMOTE THOSE PONIES & COBS!

At every show, and at every meeting or pony-related event I have ever attended, it seems as if the subject of promoting the Welsh pony comes up. Now I understand that this is, and should be, a subject near and dear to all of us with ponies to sell, whether we be breeders or just the owner of one or two performance ponies. But for all of this, it appears to be like NATO—No Action, Talk Only. It's like pulling teeth to get someone to load up a pony or two and

go to a horse fair, or put on a demonstration, etc.

Now admittedly, some of these events costs money, and I'm not aware of anyone who doesn't find that commodity in short supply. However, many of these events are free (other than the cost of the gas to get there and the time involved). So why aren't we—the Welsh Pony—in these events? The same applies in some measure to the cob classes in the shows. For years I've heard cob owners lament that they have no place to show their

Cobs—but do they support the shows that offer cob classes? Ha! And then they wonder why no one wants to put the classes in, or why, if the classes ARE offered, they are combined, or so few. I've even heard the excuse, "Well, I'll be the only one there, so why go?"

Why indeed? To show the public your cob, of course. To promote interest in this, the largest of the Welsh breed. To encourage others to buy cobs.

To encourage other cob owners to bring their cobs out. To show people what lovely animals they are. When my cob stallion was still alive, I trucked him to every show I could, even if I knew he would be the only one there. I badgered local fair management to let me put on a cob demonstration in between the morning and afternoon and the afternoon and evening sessions of the horse show. (They did, and even provided an announcer.) This I did for the love of the breed, not just to show off my stallion. And I didn't make any money from it—no stud fees, no cob babies sold. Just the pleasure of introducing people to the world of Welsh cobs.

Now maybe some of this did in fact pay off for the breed. Maybe someone I talked to or who saw Daniel eventually got a Welsh pony or cob. We'll never know. But one thing IS certain—without exposure and without promotion of some kind, we'll NEVER create a market for cobs. Without more support in the cob classes at shows, especially the larger rated shows with several different breed divisions (i.e. Morgans, Arabs, etc.) we'll be hard pressed to find any show management that will put in the Welsh cob classes, even with the promise of full sponsorships. Most show managers don't want to put in classes that don't fill (i.e., 6 or more animals) even if the classes don't cost them money. They cost a show time, and certainly aren't very entertaining for the spectators if only one or two animals appear.

Besides the 1987 American National Welsh Show in Elmira, when there were 18 cobs in the ring in the under saddle class, I have never seen ANY cob performance class that had even 6 entries in it. The breeding classes are also dismal, with seldom more than 2-3 entries, and that only if the classes have been combined (C & D) or there are no age restrictions. The Toronto Royal Winter Fair is about the only other show where I have seen a fair amount of cobs shown.

Recently, due to the enthusiastic and extensive efforts of one

of our local cob owners, Ms. Sarah Lang of Bardwyn Stud in Fonda, New York, the Welsh Pony and cob got a tremendous amount of local exposure. The Eastern NY Dressage & Combined Training Association hosts one of the most prestigious Dressage shows (sponsored by Coors beer) in the

Northeast every May. The last two years this event has been held on the grounds of the Saratoga flat track (of Travers race fame). In her fund-raising efforts on behalf of the Northeastern Welsh Pony Association show, Sarah contacted show

management to inquire about a booth to sell raffle tickets.

Several phone calls later, what started out as a booth had mushroomed into a full-blown Welsh pony and cob demonstration. From my perspective, we had the best seats in the house as we were given a large area right inside the main gate, where everyone had to pass by. Dania Leyson of Paragon Stud in Stoke, Quebec, drove Fronarth Tywysog Du and her imported mountain pony stallion, International Champion, Granby Tom Thumb for people to inquire about and admire. She also brought the exquisite cross-bred mare, Fame, to show how well a cob crosses on Thoroughbreds. Fame is out of a TB mare and by the famous Okeden Sensation, originally imported by Hope Ingersoll of Grazing Fields Farm. Although she was too late to be entered in the ENYDCTA show, Fame is being schooled in dressage and is currently doing several second training level moves. She was much admired by the dressage enthusiasts there and generated inquiries as to her breeding, which of course, helped promote interest in cobs.

Other pony owners who kindly donated their time and ponies were

Glenda Armstrong of Glynhafen Farms, who brought her lovely Section B stallion Glannant Cadence to ride and drive. (Glenda also owns cobs, one C and 2 D's, all three by Okeden Sensation). Not an official part of the NEWPA demonstration, but there participating in the Saratoga Driving Association demonstrations was Barbara Akers, also a cob owner. She very kindly brought over her two mountain ponies, Lithgow Crispin and Botvyle Prince of Orange for people to admire and pet. Representing yet another area where the versatile Welsh breed excels, Linda Vohringer brought over her mountain pony stallion, Country Prince, to show as a roadster pony. Mollie Butler of Glannant Farm kindly loaned us several videos on Welsh ponies and cobs; these were played throughout the day.

The demonstration was a huge success, so much so that the show management has asked us to return. Apart from the show itself, the Welsh pony and cob demonstrations, the mini-horses and the mounted police were the three biggest crowd pleasers. Next year they plan to let us show in front of the grandstand during the lunch break, as well as have our animals displayed near the front gate for the spectators to see and touch. Approximately 17,000 people attended this two-day show, and the

show is growing every year. We will definitely not miss this opportunity to promote our beautiful breed.

Back to the point of this article, and that is to urge all of you to do anything you can to promote the breed. In the long run, you are also promoting your own ponies. It is very necessary to show our Welsh ponies and cobs to non-Welsh pony people if we are to generate new markets and not just swap ponies with each other.

In line with this, I would like to call upon the national Welsh Pony & Cob association to supply anyone who is going to the expense and trouble to promote the breed with informational material about the breed—not just fee schedules and membership forms—but promotional material to be handed out to anyone expressing a real interest. Other than the stud books, promotion of the breed should be one of the national's prime concerns. To this end, the WPCSA should budget monies to provide local organizations that are participating in promotional events, informational pamphlet free of charge, rather than leaving it to the individual(s) to bear the cost alone.

EVERYONE benefits from these type of promotional activities—not just the local breeders/owners.

The Scole Driving Cobs

The popularity and success of the Welsh breed in competitive carriage driving owes much to the influence of Mrs. Gladys Dale, the founder and owner of the famous Scole Welsh Cod stud in North Berwick, and the President of the Welsh Pony and Cob Society.

Gladys Dale was elected president of the Society at last year's annual general meeting, and her term of office came to an end at this year's annual meeting held at Edinburgh in March. Apart from serving as council member since 1978, she works tirelessly representing Scotland and the North of England; was the first Scottish born President of the Welsh Pony and Cob Society, and is one of the busiest people on the driving scene.

As well as attending meetings in her capacity as President of the Welsh Breed Society, Gladys is the driving representative on the British Horse Society's Scottish committee, serves on the committee of the Scottish Branch of the British Driving Society, is in great demand as a Welsh breed, mountain and moorland, and driving judge, and still finds time to organise the popular Seacliff driving trials each April.

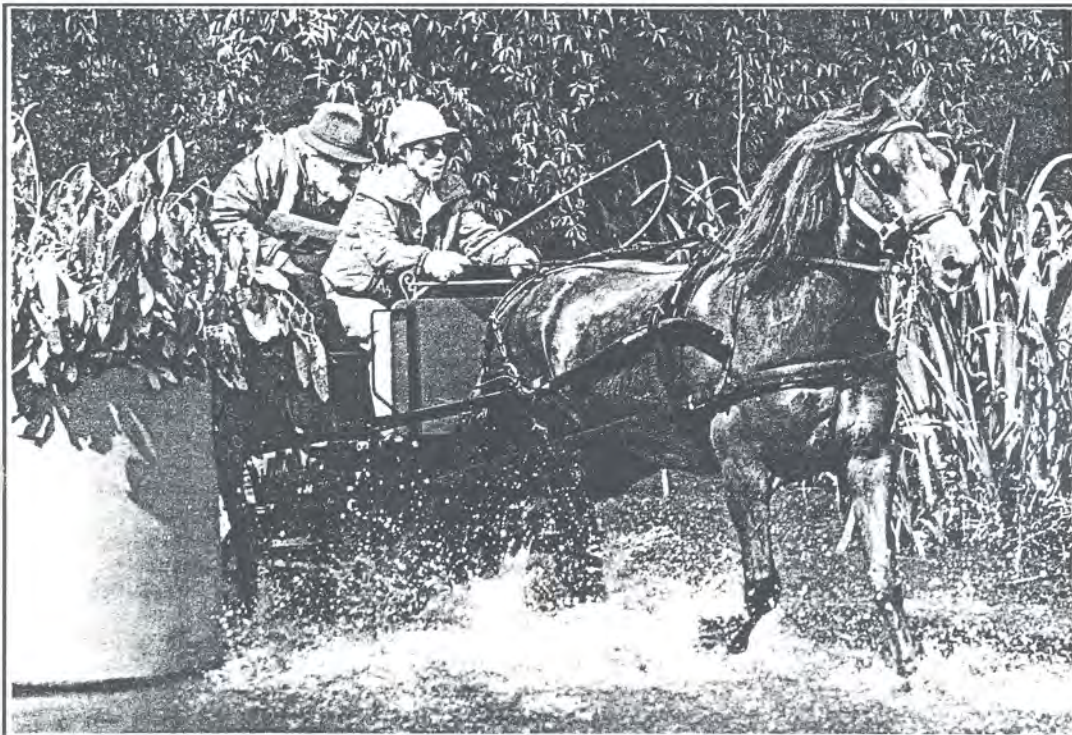
She arranged for Welsh Pony and Cob Society annual general meeting to be held in Edinburgh this year because, as she says: "I felt very strongly that I had to give all the Scottish and North of England members the chance of attending."

Brought up on the outskirts of Edinburgh by parents who were not interested in horses or ponies, Gladys was allowed a Shetland pony which she enjoyed riding and driving. During the summer holidays, she went to stay with fiends in Berwickshire where she was able to ride an Irish cob for some hours each day.

After her marriage she became involved in the Pony Club as soon as her children were old enough to start riding, and organised the first East Lothian Pony Club camp in 1962, as well as bringing the Pony Club tetrathlon to Scotland. Galdys was involved with the organisation of the Pony Club for 20

years and, when her own children grew older, she started the Lannermuir Riding Club.

The Club grew so popular that it has now been divided into two regions. "After 15 years, I seemed to be getting more and more involved with the driving," Galdys explained. "So I decided to give up the club, but before I left the committee, we decided to split north and south into two riding clubs."

Her interest in driving led to regular competitive outings with her Welsh cob, Caergwelas Jago, at northern events. She drove one of the first Bennington competition carriages, built by Michael Mart of Artistic Iron Products, and won the first Scottish driving trials at Dalmahoy. Her daughters, Carol and Barbara, also became accomplished whips and Carol was twice National Champion, in 1976 and 1978, with her Welsh cob gelding, Grandby Gent.

"I had great fun at the driving events," says Gladys, "but unfortunately I was laid off for a year and so Carol, who never misses an opportunity to try something new, took Jago and put him in front of Gent to drive tandem.

Soon afterwards Gladys was asked by Frank Haydon to become an FEI driving judge, and is now one of the most widely respected judges on the circuit.

She decided to start the East of Scotland Carriage Driving Association, initially, she explains, because she wanted to hold a two day driving event at Scoughall and had been told it would have to be run under the auspices of a club. The Association now has members from all parts of the Borders, Kelso, and

Hawick area, and the Seacliff driving trials, in North Berwick, at the end of April has become one of the most popular fixtures in the driving calendar, attracting competitors from Scotland and the North of England — many of whom drive Welsh cobs and ponies, or Welsh cob crosses.

Her interest in the Welsh breed started when she joined the Scottish and Northern Welsh Pony and Cob Association, and visited the 1965 Royal Welsh Show, where she watched the Welsh Cob ridden classes with Miss Pauline Taylor, the founder and owner of the world famous Llanarth Stud.

Gladys was very impressed by the Section D cobs. That year Llanarth Brummel was champion and her sire Llanarth Braint was reserve

champion. "They were both bred by Miss Taylor and I thought what a wonderful achievement." Gladys explained, and at the second Llanarth sale she purchased her first Welsh cob, Golden Jewel, an attractive palamino mare by Llanarth Braint.

Gladys Dale's Scole Stud was established around five mares. The first three, all by Llanarth Braint, were Golden Jewel, Llanarth Morwena, and Llanarth Nest. The other two were Llanarth Bess and Sheila II. To begin with, she used to lease the stallions, but decided to keep one at the stud. Recently there have been two stallions at Scole, both sons of Llanarth Meredith called Llanarth Touch and Go and Llanarth Rhun. Gladys started breeding Welsh cobs at Scole because, she says, they are the most versatile horses. She has proved her point by breeding performance animals which have been successful in nearly all equestrian disciplines.

The most outstanding sons of Golden Jewel, bred at the Scole Stud, were the world class driving cobs Scole Zircon and Scole Jade. One of the proudest moments in Gladys Dale's life was watching George Bowman win the Pitney Bowes Pairs Driving Championship with Scole Zircon and Scole Jade at the Royal International Horse Show at Wembley in 1976, and seeing the Scole prefix illuminated on the main scoreboard.

With the addition of Scole Rebound and Alfie, George also won the National Championships for teams of four, and was selected for the British team in the 1976 World Championships in Apeldoorn, Holland. Scole Zircon went on to become a key member of George's medal-winning teams until 1982, and is probably one of the best known horses in the history of FEI driving.

Scole Nora is the most famous daughter of Llanarth Nest. By Scole Morhys, she was bought by Louise Ruffe as a four year old and is a real all-rounder. Louise hunted, showed side-saddle and astride, and competed in working hunter and Riding Club events with the mare, who excelled in ridden dressage and jumping, and all this before she had begun to compete in horse driving trials.

Louise and Scole Nora dominated the Single Horse driving class, winning the Points League Championships three years running from 1986 to 1988, and the National Championships three years running, from 1987 to 1989. Scole Nora has won the Welsh Pony and Cob Society Performance awards for Section D mares and geldings twice, and finished top in the Scottish North of England Performance Championship with nine firsts in different disciplines including driving, ridden dressage, and showjumping.

Llanarth Bess's colt, Scole Barrie, was driven very successfully in the Singles class by Gordon Henderson, and in his pair when they were the highest placed British entry in the 1987 World Pair Driving Championships at Reisenbeck, in Germany. Golden Jewel's last filly, Scole Jubilee, was driven by Gladys' daughter Carol in tandem with Scole Andrew, and Carol scored a string of victories in the Horse Tandems class at National events with the dun Section D cobs.

The Scole Welsh cobs are particularly outstanding in competitions because of their scope and versatility. The quality that shines in the shoe ring, combined with the strength and stamina shown in the hunting field, make Welsh cobs difficult to beat in the three phases of horse driving trials. With their natural exuberance, free and active eye-catching action, they can produce a sparkling dressage test which is a pleasure to watch.

Their strength and stamina, reliability, soundness, and courage across-country also make them the ideal driving trials horse. They are agile through the hazards quick, intelligent and responsive to the driver's commands, but sensible enough when the driver gets into any difficulty, and the suppleness

and speed through the cones ensures they finish the competition in fine style.

The Scole Welsh cobs have been sold abroad to Switzerland, Germany, Denmark and America. Gladys has recently given over the running of the stud to her daughter Barbara, who has shown both Llanarth Touch and Go and Llanarth Rhun and been champion in-hand, ridden and driven with both stallions at the Royal Highland twice, and been champion in the ridden class at the Royal Welsh.

Although the Scole stud is smaller these days, because at one time there were 12 mares but Barbara has cut the number to a more manageable four, they continue to breed quality, performance cobs, and Gladys still works tirelessly to promote the Welsh breed and driving in Scotland.

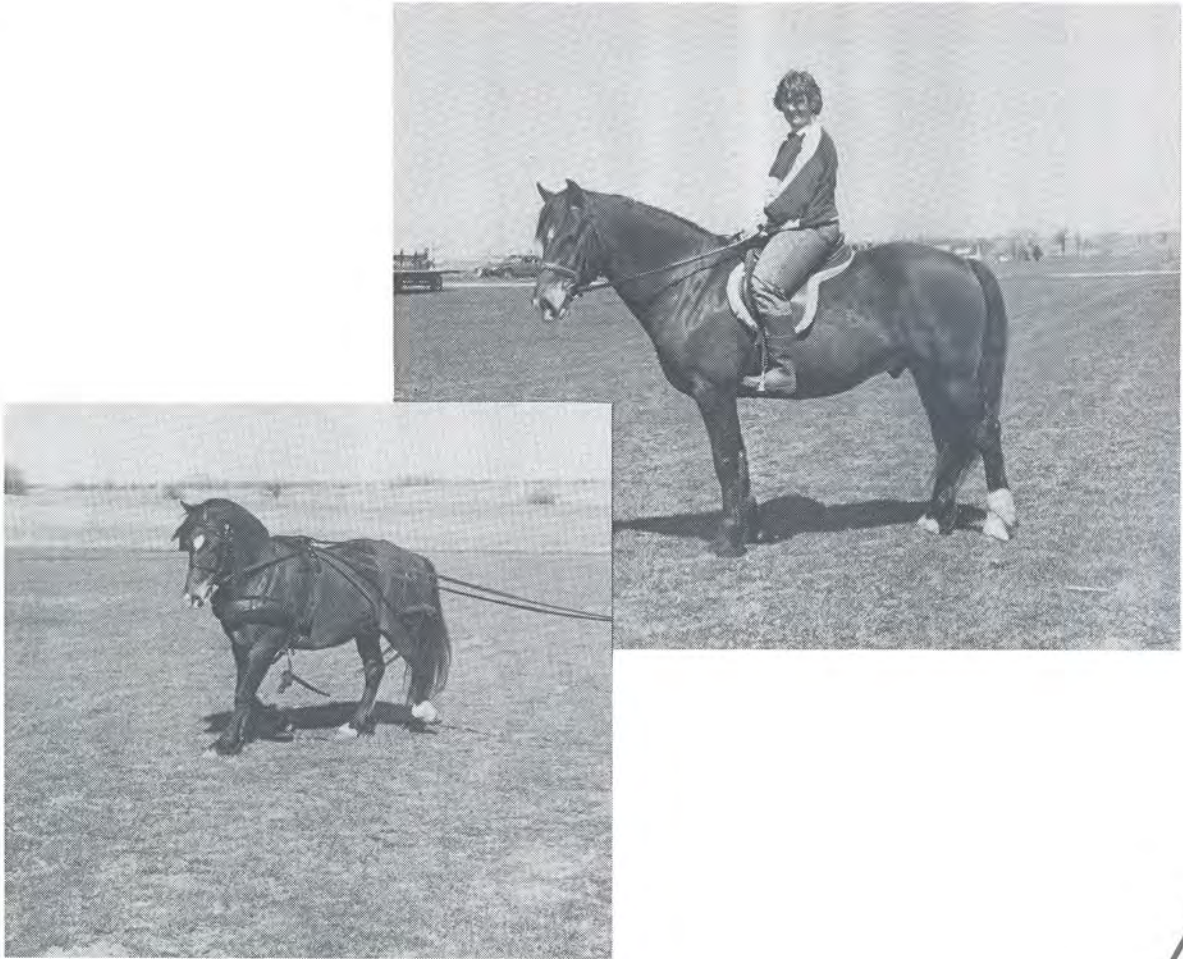

as we climbed up into Malibu Canyon, the lush new foliage seemed to cover very well the scars of the devastating forest fires of the previous years.

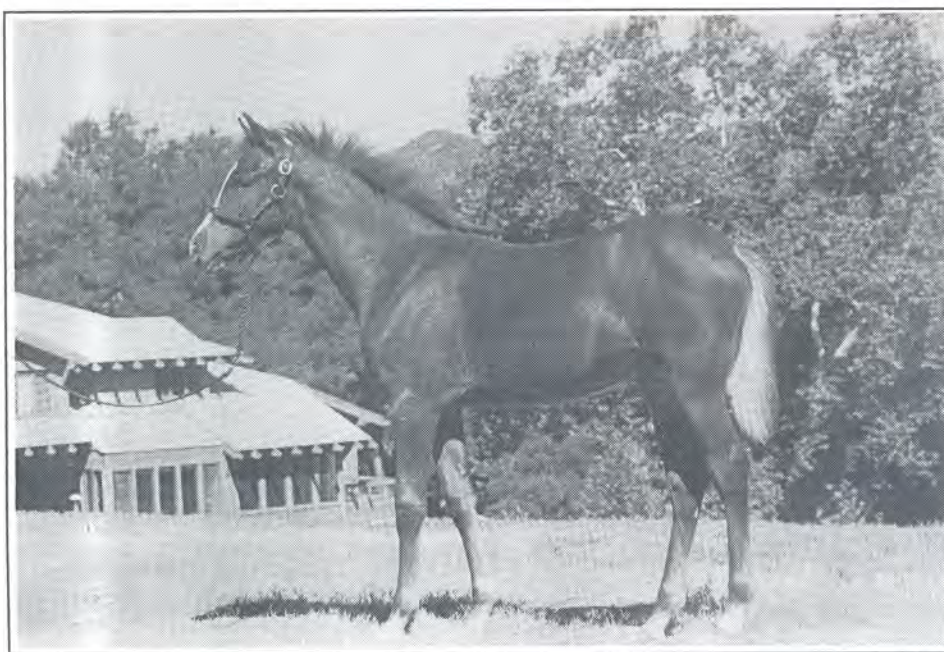
