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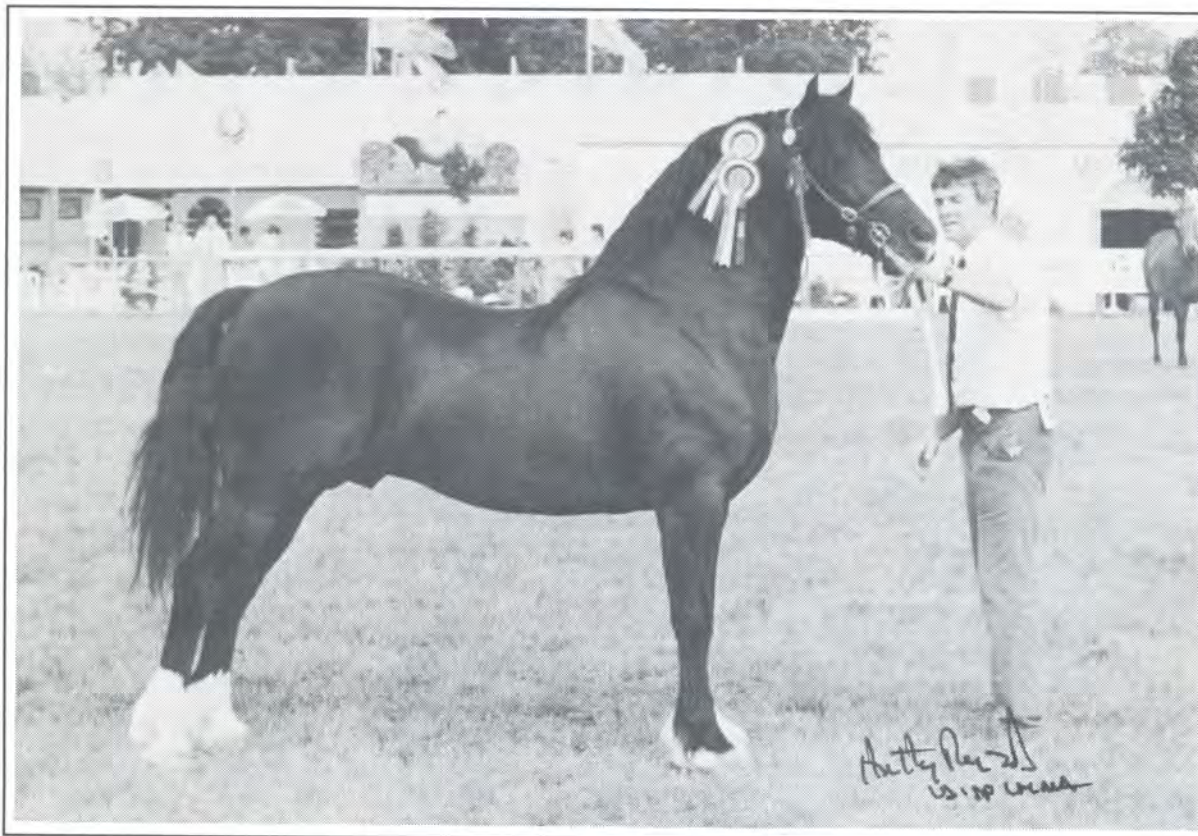

Even I have gotten a compliment "Soft, pleasant rider" (worth a 6).

Unfortunately for our total score we also get 4's (Ouch!) when Mr. Magnum, the ultimate tourist, bird watcher, horticulturist and party guy, stops at C to meet the Judge rather than trotting at C ("Late transition"—4), birdwatches during halt at X; "Isn't that a yellow-beaked twitter-whistle?" ("Nice and straight but restless and head high"—4), practices horticulture at B; "A forsythia? No, I believe that's a —Hey! I wasn't done looking at that!" ("Circle irregular and horse above the bit"—4.) For some reason we seem to end well with consistent 6's on our final halt (gracious judges?). Three out of four judges have been grinning at me as I make my final salute. Magnum has that effect on people—he's just a funny guy.

So, we are having great fun, although I fear our trainer is embarrassed. She says if I just "stay out of Magnum's way" we'll get consistent 7's all down the test! Well! She gets a chance to put her money where her mouth is as she is riding for the next three shows and Ger and I will lounge around playing "Owner, Patron of the Arts" role. (Ger will wear an ascot and I a big flowered hat—NOT!) I will keep you appraised. Our trainer (5'2" and 99 pounds of good-humored tough love) will no doubt gain and hold Magnum's attention sufficiently to turn in more respectable scores. I just hope she has as much fun as I'm having!

Part II: Cindy, Well hush my mouth! She did it! You will recall that my trainer told me if I just "stayed out of Magnum's way" he would get 7's down the page of his dressage tests? Well, she did it this weekend (almost). Here's the scoop:

My trainer, Michelle Merkin, has decided that Magnum has improved enough for *her* to be seen on him and has ridden him in the last two shows. At our first "pro rider show" the first weekend in August she rode training level tests 2 and 4 and I was gratified when she only bettered *my* last ride score by 3.5 points. As she came out of the ring I said, "Makes the amateur owner look pretty darn good." She graciously gave me that but pledged that she would "do better" on the next test. I said, "You'll do *different*, I'm not holding you to *better*." (I've been riding this little beast all summer, I know how wiggly and silly he can be.) Michelle replied, "I'm holding me to better." She then roped another professional trainer in to be *her* coach and reader and put a 30 minute warm-up/training session on Magnum and then went in and turned in a "personal best" for the little red horse! A 60.417! Our nemesis, the left lead, limited us.

Two weeks later (just this last weekend) we went to another show and bettered that score. With the notable exception of a missed left lead (corrected in two strides) and a break to canter in a trot circle (corrected in one stride) Magnum got 7's straight

down the page! Final score 63.333! The test was double judged and the second judge gave us two 8's!

We are insufferable, of course. We think we are such hot stuff. One of the reasons we enjoy dressage is that it is not a competitive sport—your score is against perfection, not another horse's performance. Nevertheless, we were pretty pleased that

we scored better than the Lippizan ridden by a pro trainer and the Bavarian Warmblood that they flew to Bavaria to purchase and import and who has been with his pro trainer *much* longer. When we got our test back I ran outside in the parking lot (where I wouldn't disturb the horses warming up or riding their tests) and jumped up and down and squealed (I am such a restrained and cultured individual)!

Well, I know I'm impressed. In fairness to me and my riding, "staying out of Magnum's way," involved a lot of "getting in Magnum's way at the right time" and was a tough enough job that Michelle comes out of the arena drenched in sweat. Making things look easy is *very* hard work!

I now have a month to improve my ability to both stay out of Magnum's way and get in his way sufficiently to turn in a moderately impressive score at the Championship Show, where I will ride, rather than Michelle. It is getting easier. Magnum

seems to have turned a corner with this last show and it is getting easier to hold his attention.

Magnum is back home as of September 1 as we ran out of money two mmonths ago and Michelle trained all of August on credit because she loves Magnum. Our big goal for the winter is to get our training bill paid and more money saved up so Magnum can go back to Michelle next spring. (If you've got a talented Cob I highly recommend Michelle).

# A MATTER OF COLOUR

Understand that there is a move afoot among a real minority in the W.P. & Cob Society to try and debar registration of horses with a white mark on the body. As a veteran member of the Society I feel in duty bound to state how potentially divisive and destructive such a standpoint is and that it is based on a false premise.

1. To call such animals skewbald or piebald is to stand truth on its head. The patches on those varieties of horse are total, constant and unmistakable and transmitted to their offspring in a uniform and consistent pattern. The small patches on cobs and ponies are not of a consistent pattern, covering the whole body; neither are they transmitted in consistent and foreseeable patterns. Anyone who deems them one and the same is afflicted by the blindness of prejudice.

2. The palomino has no tradition in Welsh cobs and ponies as a definition of colour earlier than Llanarth Braint in the 40's, but I would not dream of excluding palominos from registration although the new edition of the Macmillan Encyclopedia states "Palominos are often Arabs or American hunter horses but may be of any light saddle-horse breeds. They are recognised as a colour breed in the U.S.A. but do not breed true." The old Welsh dun colour was not palomino, Cymro Llwyd of 80 years ago and Cardi Llwyd of 50 years ago were not palominos. I accept palomino colouring but it is more alien to the breed than more traditional colours with a white patch or two.

3. If you don't like chestnut roans or bay and blacks with white hairs or white patches, I presume that you have a right to your preference in the same way that I have no liking for some of the lithe, leggy, gutless bays with a star that seems to have stepped (or galloped) directly out of Newmarket. This is a matter of aesthetic judgment but we have no right to insist on genetic engineering preventing registration, to feed our irrational prejudices.

4. The other day I heard one of the latter-day know-all's maintaining that there were no white Welsh Cobs. How ignorant can one get! Of course they had never heard of some

of the founding "fathers" Cel Gwyn Bach Blaengorffen (the little white horse of Blaengorffen) and Cel Gwyn Blaenpennal (the white horse of Blaenpennal). Not to mention Pant Grey Star (very soon all white), overall champion in the Royal Welsh and a beautiful white cob stallion Peris Satisfaction best local classes stallion at the Royal Welsh Aberystwyth 1933. I was there!

5. An obvious example of cutting off your nose to spite your face if this absurd disqualification were ever countenanced, is the number of highly important breeding animals that would be eliminated! The most prejudiced (and it is such a funny old world! to quote Margaret Thatcher) would require the tremendous influence for the good of the Hendy Brenin strain in today's cobs. His sire Meiarth Royal Eiddwen (by Brenin Gwalia) had a white patch on his belly which was hardly, if ever, transmitted. So did Mathrafal. It did not prevent Eiddwen from being a champion at shows all over England before returning home and winning at the Royal Welsh as well. Derwen, Nebo, Synod, Fronarth, Gwrthafarn you name them all have strong transfusions of this Brenin blood. What if the "patch" eliminators had their way; cancelling these strains all derived from Mathrafal Brenin.

6. White patches and other markings are not confined to chestnuts and roans. I have seen blacks and even bays with prominent white on bodies, heads and legs and among them were some of the most correctly typical of Welsh Cobs and Ponies that I remember.

7. Returning to the case of palominos, they have a palomino section in shows and the same animals are allowed to compete in their particular breed sections at the same shows. I do not object; live and let live.

8. When dictatorships and apartheid are dying the death among enlightened humans are we to impose them anew upon our Welsh Cobs and Ponies? I say never, unless you wish the eventual disintegration of the society.

9. This steed called Exclusion should be eliminated at the starting gate. Its suspect pedigree is, possibly 90% jealousy and 10% ignorance. I have been a life member of the Welsh Pony & Cob Society for 44 years. My memory of the best and worst extends to 60 years and I can assure you that among white-patched cobs and ponies there have been some of the greatest of this country.

How true the accumulated horseman's wisdom that a horse was always good whatever its colour might be. Conformation first and second.

# Driving a Pair of Cobs

Bob Johnson, a name familiar to followers of team chasing as sponsor of the Fosse Manor team, has now succeeded in horse driving trails, winning the 1992 Lexus National Horse Pairs Championship at Windsor in August after only his second season in the sport.

Bob Johnson, the owner of Fosse Manor Hotel at Stow-on-the-Wold, a keen hunting man and self-confessed adrenalin addict, has discovered the exhilarating sport of horse driving trials and, at the age of 48, is hooked.

Last year Bob made his debut in the fiercely competitive horse pairs class and finished in the top 10 of the Beneficial Bank Points League Championship. This year, with his win at the nationals, he finished fifth.

"I was looking forward to this season as it was very hot starting off in pairs class in world championship year [1991]; the competition was intense. Winning the nationals this year was a big surprise—it was very close but it was magic."

... "I love hunting but there's so much more involvement in driving, your groom can do some of the ridden flat work but there is no substitute for driving your own horses. They have to know your voice. I was a total novice at the start of last season. I did a few club events in 1990 and my first national at Lulworth and I was completely bitten. Taking nothing away from hunting which I have loved, I wish I had discovered horse driving trials twenty-one years ago."

It was team driver Jim French who first sparked Bob's interest in carriage driving. Jim asked him if he would like to go for a drive, harnessed up his team of cobs and took him out for an hour. "I thought this is some crack. I haven't done this before, and strangely enough I now own two of the cobs who were in the team he put together—Idris and Bracken."

... "Then all of a sudden there was this advert in Horse and Hound for a matching pair of chestnut cobs," Bob remembers. "So I phoned Jim French and went to see them. And that was it, I bought Idris and Bracken. Mind you, they had not been used for eighteen months and they were like woolly bears. I couldn't see what I was buying."

Idris and Bracken were leader and wheeler in Jim's cob team which he had driven in the 1988 World Championships at Apeldoorn in Holland and decided to sell them on when he bought his black Hungarian horses.

Bob is really pleased with the experienced pair of cobs. "They did me really well last year and I was coming up three or four places on the marathon. Bracken has an engine like a Jaguar, he is brilliant."

At the early events, Bob drove Idris and Bracken and finished fifth in the international pairs class at Brighton driving trials, which was won by the French driver Marc Deroide. They took fifth again at St. Fort and improved to fourth overall at Streatlam Park. But disaster struck at the following event at Tatton Park in June, when they turned over in the second marathon obstacle and Bob had to withdraw from the competition.

It was then that Alwyn Holder offered to sell him Nuggett, an 11-year-old chestnut cob and fortunately, Nuggett fitted right in. Bob travelled to Saumur in France to compete in the international pairs class and drove Nuggett with Bracken on the marathon.

Although they missed a gate in the second obstacle, Bob says it was great experience and gave him a taste of top-class

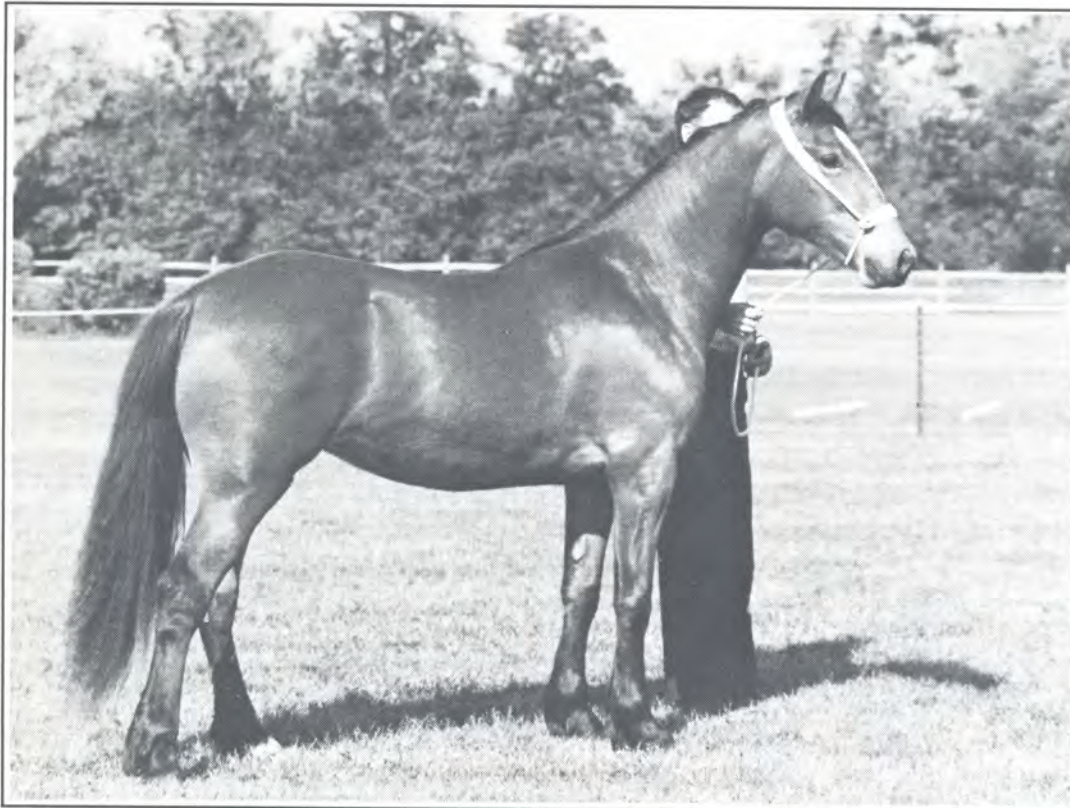

international competition. He returned to complete the national circuit and celebrated with a victory at Castle Howard, before finishing a close second to Barry Capstick at Lowther and capturing the national title at Windsor in August.

"I get more uptight about the dressage than I do for the marathon. Having point-to-pointed, hunted and ridden cross-country, I always look forward to the marathon. I'm an aggressive rider. "I would like to represent my country. Who wouldn't? And what other sport is there for a chap of my age where there is still a chance to represent your country in a world championship?"

## Excerpts from the Welsh Part-Bred Horse Report, 9/2/92

*By Hilary Legard*

The enthusiasm was infectious at an Open Meeting in Oxfordshire to discuss the promotion of a thoroughly British type of performance horse, the Welsh Part-Bred Horse: considered by many to be The Competition Breed of the Future.

The initial aims are to 1) encourage the breeding of Welsh Part-Bred Horses, particularly those with 25% and less Welsh blood, to supply a steadily growing demand. 2) to promote the concept of the Welsh Part-Bred Horse as a foundation from which to breed the type of horses in demand for modern equestrian sports and leisure riding. 3) to further stimulate the demand for Welsh Part-Bred Horses by raising their profile in areas of performance. 4) to address the broader question of registration of Welsh Part-Bred Horses.

The Welsh Part-Bred Horse is over 14.2 hh with a minimum of 25% registered Welsh blood. The most sought after cross is the thoroughbred crossed with Welsh Cob.

Welsh Part-Bred Horses have been successful for years in competitions but have not been recognised. Since 1988 the Welsh Pony & Cob Society have identified just over 50 competing at top levels in eventing, dressage and showjumping.

Another point of interest is the officially recommended mix for breeding an Endurance Horse is Arab/Welsh Cob/Thoroughbred. Here is a truly British horse, with all the attributes of the fashionable continental breeds plus many more:

Welsh Part-Bred Horses are considered to be courageous, strong excellent movers, consistently talented jumpers and a decent size. Added to which they are adaptable, tough and sound, with that elemental sixth sense so invaluable in a cross-country horse.

The meeting drew to its conclusion with the agreement amongst those present that the main thrust of the Group and its supporters should be concentrated around three main areas.

Firstly, to encourage breeders to produce more Welsh Part-Bred Horses suitable for competitive work. Consideration is being given to ways of ensuring these horses are registered, and the possibility of awarding Welsh Cob mare premiums for cross-breeding and breeders prizes.

Secondly, that strong links are maintained with the press concerning the progress of this type of horse and its successes thereby endorsing its contribution to the poll of British-Bred performance horses which in turn will promote the idea of the selective breeding of Welsh Part-Bred Horses.

Thirdly, encouraging Welsh Part-Bred Horses to compete and be identified alongside all types of performance horses; also that awards be offered in the Competition Horse classes and others such as the Gleneagles Young Showjumper and the Burghley Young Event Horse to the highest placed registered Welsh Part-Bred Horse. There has been a tremendous show of support already from the BSJA and Dressage Group towards this idea.

## George and Me and Pat Parelli

It seems every story I tell starts with Beach Baby. This one is no exception. At the age of 20 years, she foaled a lovely palomino colt by our Welsh Cob stallion. This was a first for both Briton and Beach Baby. As with everything she does, Beach Baby was a marvelous mother. She was solicitous but over protective, and she did not miss a single fox-hunt.

There was no question that I wanted this foal to be mine forever. So it was crucial that his training start from day one. My daughter and I began immediately by following Dr. Robert Miller's Imprint Training for the Foal. We came up with a name to give our foal something to reach towards. He was christened "Briton's American Flyer" to express his Welsh heritage. Very quickly, though, he became "George" because he just looked like a George.

George's early training was slow but steady. He accompanied his Mum on trail rides being led as she went

along. He went to breed shows, and was shown in halter. And like Topsy, he just GREW.

At four, George went to start his saddle training. He proceeded with high grades from the trainer. After only one month, he came home to go on with "miles" and "wet blankets". It became apparent that because he had been such a star pupil, George thought the quicker we get to the canter, the quicker the session ends. He also felt that a 20 minute session was quite sufficient, there was no suppleness in his body and he became "chargey" and stiff. He was not trying to get rid of his rider, just get it right so we can quit. It's a scary thing to be faced with a problem like this when it is so important not to make this into a bigger problem. Fortunately, I have a network of friends to consult and one of them, like the cavalry, came to my rescue. My friend, Marion Youngs, had attended a Pat Parelli clinic in Arizona. I watched Pat's tapes thinking "Can I really do this?" George and I went back to basics. We started again with Pat's ground training. We went on to saddling,

bridling, and mounting. It was really interesting to find ways of doing these "basics" that made sense to both George and me. I became more confident but not aggressive like the predator that I am. George became more confident and less the prey animal he is.

It does seem to me, that communication is the key word in Pat's Horse-Man-Ship. Some of the others at the stable razzed me that this seemed to be a step backwards. We were just walking, trotting, backing up, and turning. Certainly, it wasn't roaring around at a canter which threatened to turn into a hand gallop at any minute. Prior to Parelli work, when you gave the signal to "whoa", George could be very impressive at putting on his brakes. Now we were practicing reaching down and signaling with one rein. George was getting the idea and instead of screeching to a stop, he was breaking smoothly down from a trot to a walk to a stop. This was feeling good. It was starting to feel like George and I were learning to talk to one another. Not only were we communicating, we were learning to respect one another.

After about three weeks, I asked for a canter. There was an instant response. It was a smooth transition to a lovely canter—no stiffness, no charging, just a nice canter. We went both directions and then we did more trot transitions before finishing up. After all, I didn't want George to think that canter meant we were done working.

Video tapes are great, but meeting the real live Pat Parelli is much, much better. Pat is a bright articulate man with a good sense of humor. In June he did a demonstration at Indianapolis prior to a clinic he was holding there. It was an

entertaining and informative evening. Pat has an aptitude for teaching the horse and human. George and I didn't attend the clinic as we were waiting for a closer clinic to be held in September. To my dismay, this clinic was cancelled.

In the meantime, George and I were practicing what we had learned out on the trails. I have to say that George remembered his lessons better than I remembered mine. If there is one trait applicable to me, however, it is persistence. I knew now that this Parelli stuff works. I wanted to know more and as soon as possible. The next and nearest clinic was in Columbia, Missouri.

There were a lot of obstacles to overcome. There's my job, the boarding kennel, twenty dogs, and five horses that need 24 hours a day care. Thank goodness my husband is an understanding man. And my good friend, Marion, came a long with keep me company, and awake, on the nine hour trip.

It was an easy drive to Columbia. The facilities were excellent. Both George and I suffered diminished appetites due to excitement. I'm sure I worried more about his than he did about mine.

We started work very early Saturday morning. Watching and studying the video tapes was very helpful. It made it easier to apply Pat's teachings. I am not particularly coordinated and at 55 I'm more arthritic than athletic. I cannot tell you what a thrill it was to do these things with George. We were given a progression of steps to accomplish. There was
